The Shire has no specific plans for development of the area but would be sympathetic to suggestions and proposals from the residents of Upper Beaconsfield.

Norm Wilson of Sutherland Road has offered the proposal which we show on Page 2 for the development of the site as a barbecue area, bush walks and an exercise track. The aim is to maintain the area as close to its natural state as possible. Look at this plan, alter it, approve it, or rub it out and start again! Leave your comments with Ray Ratcliff at the Post Office or come to our next B.U.A. meeting on 7th October and give us your opinion.

If a majority of the community approves (or at least is only apathetic towards) the idea of a park, we will present a plan to the Shire for approval and aid in applying for various grants which could be available.

Could you, or someone you know, provide sponsorship in some way, e.g. a donation or a gift as a prize? - or your help in some way?



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UPPER BEACONSFIELD ENVIRONMENTAL STUDY

The UB Environmental Study Questionnaire has now been distributed to all households in UB. A total of 450 (Approx.) questionnaires were sent out.

The Study Team wish to express their thanks to all who participated in the survey. Thanks go to each household who completed a questionnaire. Special thanks are due to the "helpers" who distributed and picked up the questionnaires; and to the members of the BUA committee who assisted with the organisation of distribution of questionnaires and with the Pilot Survey. The next step with the Study is to collect the questionnaires from the Post Office for coding, and processing on the Monash computer. The data obtained from the survey results will be used by the Study Team for various aspects of the Study, e.g. Ian Newman will use information on effluent disposal, Pat Condina will use information on Stoney Creek, while I will be looking at attitudes to the future of UB.

Preliminary results of the survey will be made available to the BUA as they are to hand.

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PAUL GROVE DRAINAGE SCHEME

The Council's scheme for a combined drainage/treated waste system has been abandoned for the time being. This will give the Council and others time to consider some of the many ramifications of such a drainage scheme.

There is no questioning the technical competence of the scheme as it stood, and future studies may find that such a scheme may be desirable in many respects. Apart from the social implications of the scheme, the main problem lay in the fact that it only provided half the answers - it would pipe the area's effluent and drainage to a certain point, but no details were given of how this sometimes polluted drainage would then be disposed of in an environmentally acceptable way. Obviously a total plan is necessary and it may happen that such an integrated approach may be more economically attractive.

Some early results of tests around the Paul Grove area indicate that the effluent in the roadside drain is high in nutrients and organic matter. For example, samples at the end of Paul Grove give values of phosphorus and nitrogen over ten times higher than in the creek. Such a flow if allowed to reach the creek would certainly adversely affect it. Fortunately, at present this effluent is being absorbed and assimilated downstream of Paul Grove and few pollutants would enter the creek for the greater part of the year. Piping would mean that full advantage was not being taken of such natural treatment processes.

When one considers that so few people were inconvenienced by poor drainage and that fewer still would actually derive real benefit from the scheme, it seems wise to have deferred implementation until such time as a scheme which is fully consistent with desired development of the area is proposed.

All in all, the members of the UBA are vigorously pursuing many matters of interest or concern to the residents of Upper Beaconsfield.

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WHO FLIES THE VILLAGE FLAG?

Often asked when the flagpole adjacent to the cenotaph in Salisbury Road carries the national emblem. This question is best answered by one man - the President of the local R.S.L. sub-branch.

Sometimes celebrating a Commonwealth occasion, or regretfully marking a bereavement, the flag is raised by Mr. Frank Conn, a dedicated R.S.L. stalwart for decades.

Though declining in numbers, the sub-branch is very active and the Clubhouse in Halford Road (adjacent to the Fire Brigade Station) the scene of regular social functions, Public occasions, such as Anzac Day, provides the opportunity for district residents to enjoy the hospitality of former servicemen and women. Another annual event open to all is the fete conducted on the last Saturday in November by the R.S.L. Ladies Auxiliary. This group, headed by Mrs. Nell Fullerton, welcomes public support, both by patronising the popular raffles, and by attending the stalls and novelty attractions.

Present were Mr. Ray Allen, Deputy Principal and Bus Officer of the School, two formidable men from the Transport Regulation Board, and Barbara Baldwin, Jeanette Ballinger, Linda Brodie and Jenny Lord. It was finally agreed that the Moloney Bus Service would be asked to arrange routing to eliminate the 40 to 45 minute wait, at the school - especially at night - and the T.R.B, men agreed reluctantly to do this.

The mothers will obtain numbers and computer listings from the school, and try to work out re-routings straight to Berwick High to eliminate delays in the Moloney and Sincoe services, as well as to try to extend the service to pick up the 20 or so children in the Foott, Manestar and Red Hill Roads area.

DEWHURST.....More recollections from readers.....

Even in the recent long, cold, wet, windy winter, we have not had snow. But back in the days of horse transport, when show fell it was a real problem for horses. When L.A. Wilson had to go up to Emerald from Dewhurst after a fall of snow, he had to stop frequently to clear snow from the horses' hooves, to enable the animals to get a grip on the steep hilly tracks. For the same reason, those Christmas card pictures of coaches speeding merrily through the snow are mostly imagination.

Mr. Allan, who lived at Bim Bim Be for a time, next bought "Staverton" above Guys Hill. He was killed when a cartload of manure overturned, on the road between Upper Beaconsfield and "Faldinghurst".

There were Scout and Cub troupes in Dewhurst, led by Alan Thompson.

Dewhurst appears to have had no permanent garage business. The Fire Brigade had an account with Belfield, who started the garage in Upper Beaconsfield, on land that belonged to Bob Bickham.

The present house "Blue Ridge" at the east end of Berglund Road, was built by Freighters Ltd. as their staff country club. At the original house on the site there was a "horse works". A horse was harnessed to a pivoted beam, and it walked round and round a circular track. Power was transmitted from the pivot by gears and belts, to operate farm machinery.

Ray Wilson and his brothers lived in a shack between L.A. Wilson's place and the school, before he built a house beside the "New Road". Edwards was one of the weekenders at Dewhurst. W. Bennett followed Cation in the Post Office building, but he did not continue the Post Office business. He had large hire cars. When Mrs. Wilson was at "Glenbrae" she took boarders; usually the school teacher stayed there.

Colin Rowse had the "Crystal Brook" nursery and contracting business. He laid out the grounds of "Clover Cottage" in Manuka Road, Berwick, when Mr. Tuckfield of TinyTips Tea bought the place. Eric Bumpstead worked for him there on the earthmoving and landscaping operations. Colin Rowse's father was connected with the Tintookie Puppets, and he made part of the puppets.

SHIRE PRESIDENTS REPORT

On the 10th August, 1981, I was elected to the position of President of the Pakenham Shire Council, and I thank particularly the residents of the Beacon Hills Riding who by their support over the past four years have enabled me to gain this position.

Even at this early stage I am finding the President's role to be many and varied, requiring considerable versatility and a high degree of staying power. Speech making, often impromptu, is commonplace. Efficient Chairmanship is essential, but varies greatly from a formal Council meeting to a small community group meeting, and all that is in between. Delegations to Government Ministers are frequent and different again, and so too is presiding over a Citizenship Ceremony for the very first time. With the essential need to maintain my employment, days and nights are fully occupied, and it all adds up to an exciting and challenging period. I can assure you all that I will be totally involved.

It was certainly baptism of fire as in the first few weeks Council faced up to its much awaited debate on where to build the new municipal offices. Even though both local newspapers (Pakenham Gazette and Berwick Times) included lengthy reports of the meeting, I should advise that the decision taken was to build on Duncans Hill, which is the Housing Commission land adjoining the High School.

The Pakenham Chamber of Commerce and a number of other citizens strongly supported the alternative view to build within the existing commercial centre, and emotions ran high. The debate lasted a little over three hours, the decision was taken, and it is hoped that it can now be on with the job. Building and associated costs are increasing at the rate of one and a half percent to two percent per month, and with interest rates rapidly climbing, every delay just increases the cost, so hopefully all other difficulties will be quickly resolved.

Already I have been able to invite a number of community groups to attend a Council meeting, and I will continue to do so for the entire year. Service Clubs, School Councils, Mothers Clubs, Red Cross Groups, Associations and Auxiliaries are but some of those who will be invited. I want people to see what happens at Council meetings, both the good and the not so good, and thereby draw together in a closer link the community and the Council. I will continue to encourage Council to provide open government as much as possible, with debate and decision available for all to see.
