The Department of Community Welfare Services and the Displan Personal Support Committee have gathered a team of folk who will make contact with you next week.

They are there to listen and help if you need it. You can set the pace. Each visitor will have some bits of information that you may want to know about and will be able to help you through the maze of red tape - compensation forms etc.

The visitors are ordinary folk (not experts) and are simply there to help. Your conversations will be treated with the strictest confidence.

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Make them welcome. The visitor team is there to help you and your local community to "get it all together" again. They will wear an identity tag so that you won't confuse them with the other "odd bods" who may be about.

From Wednesday 2nd March all \$1,000 Displan Grants will be available from the Department of Community Welfare Services ONLY at their Dandenong Office, 6th Floor, 280 Thomas St., Dandenong (Tel. 03 791 5244). This Grant is available to those people whose homes were destroyed, or who have lost their source of income in the fires.
2. The Department of Community Welfare Services also has small cash grants available for those people who need immediate cash assistance.
3. The Department of Social Security will no longer be present at the Hall. All enquiries should be directed to the Dandenong Office of Social Security, 294 Thomas Street, Dandenong (Telephone 03 797 5777).
4. The Infant Welfare Centre is open as usual, 9.00 a.m. -12 noon and 1.30 p.m. - 4.30 p.m. Mondays.
5. The Gippsland Bush Fire Relief Fund has money available to those families who have been burnt out to help with immediate needs. When Gippsland Bush Fire Fund personnel are unavailable see Mandy Splatt.
6. Showers are available at the Public Hall (24 hours) and at the Beacon Hills Golf Course.
7. Next Monday night (7th March) the Davis Cup Team (John Alexander, Pat Cash, Paul McNamee, Neil Fraser & Allan Stone) will give an exhibition and clinic at the Beaconsfield Tennis Club for children from families who have been burnt out ONLY.

The bus will leave from the Upper Beaconsfield Primary School at 4.40 p.m. picking up at Guys Hill Store at 4.50 p.m. Return by 7.30 p.m. Tennis shoes and rackets will be available at the Courts.
8. Please try and minimize power use on leads from temporary poles, as problems may arise with overuse.

ABOUT TO REBUILD?

A leaflet to help residents build houses better to withstand bushfires is now obtainable from the Shire's Building Office in Pakenham. Published in 1979, these "Notes on the Science of Building" (No. 154) prefer concrete floor slabs on ground, metal-deck roofs at low slope and the ability to close off all openings from sparks such as windows, chimneys, wall and roof vents. Instead of roof gutters, collection drains at ground level are suggested.

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DEBRIS CLEARING:-

The Shire of Pakenham in conduction with Berwick Service clubs and Ron Baldwins Veteran Runners are co-ordinating the clearance of debris from home sites burnt in the fires.

If your dwelling and outbuildings have been damaged or destroyed and assessment made by your insurance company, you should complete an authorisation which is available at the Upper Beaconsfield Public Hall or from the Shire Offices. This authorisation will then provide Council with advice that you wish your particular house site to be cleared.

If you are not insured the same debris clearing service will be provided by the Council.

To assist Council to identify your block please provide name and allotment particulars at the front of your property. (Signs are available at the Hall).

Council is presently concentrating on the clearance of house sites only at this stage to allow residents to get back onto their allotments and commence rebuilding. Further extended clearing will be dependant on government finance.

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BIRDS AND FIRES

In the wake of the bushfires, spare a thought for the native birds and animals that have lost their sources of food and shelter. While many birds seem to have survived the fires, there are already signs that numbers are dropping alarmingly. There is simply not enough food or unburned vegetation to support all the survivors. Some nomadic species may have left the area but other more "stay-put" kinds will die.

Residents can help by putting out food and water for the remaining birds. Containers of food should be well secured and placed in raised positions, and near a bush or overhanging tree, if possible. Bird's Porridge can be made from equal parts of dripping, honey, brose-meal (dried pea flour) and instant oats (see insert). A nectar substitute can be made by mixing 1 part honey to 10 parts water, dissolved gently over heat, but not boiled. This can be put out in a feeding bottle, or open container, but must be replaced daily.

Try throwing small pieces of cheese to small birds, and put out seed, eg, sunflower seeds or parrot mix for larger birds, and small seeds such as panikin for small finches.

Bread is not recommended, as it attracts the more aggressive species which will discourage the majority of smaller native birds. Please give some time to the local birds and animals, which add so much to the quality of life in Upper Beaconsfield.

Insert:- Melt dripping, remove from heat, add honey, brose meal and instant oats. Stir to a thick paste.

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WHERE ARE YOU?

With all the chaos of the past couple of weeks we seem to have lost contact with a number of families who have moved out of the area.
