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PAUL REID - ARCHITECT

Upper Beaconsfield has always been fortunate in having a number of talented men and women whose interests in the village have extended beyond personal and business. Paul Reid, the architect of the new Church, is one of these people. Readers will become aware of his work in planning long term solutions to traffic and development problems which are facing Upper Beaconsfield.

The new Church is close in concept to village churches in parts of Europe, and this is a result of Paul's own experiences.

After graduation from Melbourne University Paul travelled extensively in Europe visiting many churches and other public buildings. In the process he became fascinated by the charm of the architecture and the life in European villages, which have few counterparts in Australia.

On returning to Melbourne Paul was engaged by Lucas & Morris to design the Boulevard and Colonnad houses. These have been so successful over many years that over 700 have been built in Melbourne and over 500 in Sydney. They have been judged 'best project house' in the unlimited price category on a number of occasions.

The 'village atmosphere' brought Paul and his parents, Noel and Muriel, to Upper Beaconsfield in 1978, (Noel has recently retired from his Real Estate business in the Waverley area). When invited to submit a design for the new Church, Paul saw the opportunity to combine the charm of the old Church with the concepts of village Churches in Bavaria and Austria.

PLANNING THE VILLAGE CENTRE

As the village area is growing at a rather alarming rate, it must be realised by those experiencing the rapid change that all too soon the inevitable will happen: the congestion so caused, if left unchecked will give rise to a serious problem.

Anyone who has been present in the village when school buses, cars and children (both bicycling and walking) all converge on the central pick-up area, both morning and night, together with the increase in through traffic, must be aware of the increasing risk of a possibly devastating accident.

NOW IS THE TIME TO ACT.

Sensible planning of a smooth, traffic-flow system will avoid many of the risks. Too often centres like ours are allowed to grow unplanned and become awkward, impractical and unattractive.

The B.U.A. sub-committee for Town Planning Affairs has been working to establish a plan of action for the future development of the village. Designs and ideas for an alternative to the seemingly inevitable ugly and imposing dual carriageway through the village centre are being discussed in earnest at these meetings. We want and need as much support and as many opinions as possible on this urgent matter.

You are part of this community; the changing environment is your responsibility and it is your family and your friends who need to be able to continue to live comfortably, safely and proudly around a practical, thoughtfully designed village centre.

The next public meeting of the B.U.A. will devote part of the agenda to Town Planning and hopefully we will have guest speakers present to talk on this subject, so please show an interest and come along.

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UPPER BEACONSFIELD HALL  
Visit to Beaconsfield, U.K.

In last December's Village Bell, Des McKenna described how the commemorative Bell Tower which now provides such an impressive entrance to the Hall came about as the result of a spontaneous and generous appeal among the people of Beaconsfield in England, following the Ash Wednesday fires.

It is hard to think of a suitable means of acknowledging such a gesture. When the Hall Committee learnt that I was to be in London for two weeks in January this year, they decided that at the very least I should visit Beaconsfield, which is not too far to the west in Buckinghamshire, and in some way convey our thanks to them. So with the help of Graeme Beasley, President of Berwick Rotary, arrangements were made for me to travel to Beaconsfield on Saturday 19 January to do just that.

I took with me an album of photographs showing the bell tower and commemorative plaque, some shots of the village before and just after the fires, and a comprehensive set of photos of the township as it is today. These I presented on behalf of all residents of Upper Beaconsfield to a small but distinguished group of Beaconsfield dignitaries, as a record of our appreciation for the generosity of the people of Beaconsfield. This gathering took place at the home of Anne and Derek Hilton, which was appropriate considering that Derek had been very active for Rotary in coordinating the appeal and in liaising with Berwick Rotary as to its application. Others present included Mrs. Barbara Gaston who was Town Mayor at the time of the Appeal, Mrs. Elsie Barton, the present Town Mayor, and the President of Beaconsfield Rotary, Mike Mead, and his wife Pat. The occasion was suitably reported in the Bucks Free Press the following week.

ANDREWS FOUNDATION

The Upper Beaconsfield Hall was the fortunate recipient of \$5,000 from the Andrews Foundation initial grants announced last year. The presentation of the cheque was made to representatives of the Hall Committee by Mr. Ron Andrews of Pakenham Bluemetal at a ceremony held at the Shire offices, attended by other groups within the Shire who had also benefitted from the grants. The money has been used to complete external painting of the Hall and partly for re-roofing of the oldest section of the Hall.

SHIRE FUNDING

The Shire of Pakenham has also provided the Hall with a two-for-one grant of total value \$4,500 towards upkeep of the building. This money has been used in conjunction with the Andrews Foundation grant for re-roofing of the Hall. Our thanks to the Shire for providing this assistance and to David Pfeiffer for carrying out the work. Our apologies to users of the Hall for the temporary inconvenience caused during the replacement activities.

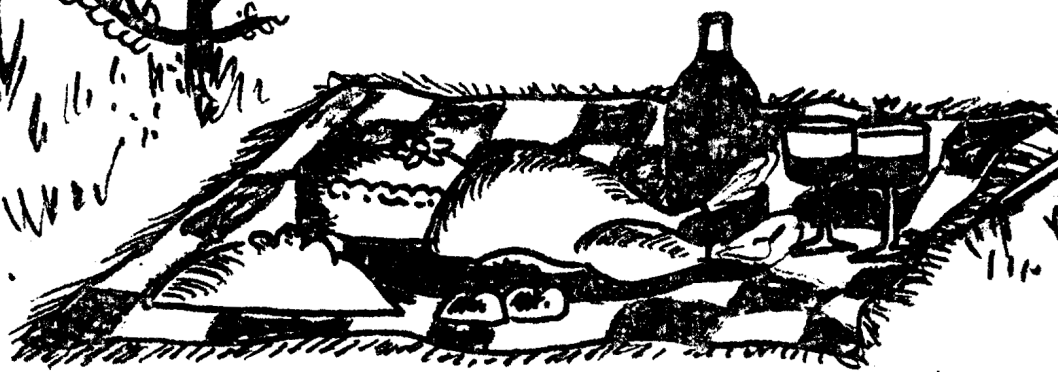

UPPER BEACONSFIELD PONY CLUB

After much hard work and negotiation the Pony Club is now well settled on its home-ground at the Recreation Reserve, secure in the knowledge that we have a safe, pleasant environment for conducting Club activities.

With fifty active riding-members, safety was and is the primary concern of the committee and to this end we have fenced the area below the oval on four sides. This, however, is in no way meant to offend the general public, nor bar them from access to the area. Adequate pedestrian access has been provided along the road boundaries. The dressage arena has been extended making it a far more workable area and, in doing so, has been lowered considerably, thus reducing the visual impact from the road. This will be further enhanced as our planned planting programme gets under way.

While local residents may have been alarmed at the arrival of a bulldozer and grader, we can assure you that minimal ground-work has been done, (with full council approval and funding) removing only a very few trees that were fire-affected and therefore potentially dangerous, and small areas of scrub.

As stated, our primary concern is safety, but, as a committee (most of us long-term residents of Upper Beaconsfield) we are equally concerned with the environment and would like to take this opportunity to reassure residents, especially those directly adjacent to the Reserve, that we have every intention of preserving and maintaining the natural environment of the area, in fact, we hope to improve it.

Any interested residents are welcome to come along to our next rally day, Saturday 23rd March, from 10.00 a.m. - 3.00 p.m., or to the A.G.M. which is to be held in the Kindergarten at 1.30 p.m. on that same day, to discuss the development and proposed use of the grounds.

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IN THE GARDEN

Trees and shrubs for Autumn colour.

A couple of deciduous trees or shrubs will make your garden much more interesting for a longer period providing colourful hues in Autumn and bright displays of blossoms or flowers in Spring. They also provide valuable shade in Summer while allowing sunlight to filter through in Winter.

Select plants that best suit your requirements and take into consideration the likes and needs of each tree and shrub to make sure it has optimum-conditions.

The following trees and shrubs will colour beautifully in Autumn; Japanese Maples (*Acer palmatum*), Smoke Bush (*Cotinus coggyzria*), Liquidambers (*Liquidamber styraciflua*), Dogwood (*Cornus Florida*), Maidenhair tree (*Ginkgo biloba*), Golden Ash (*Fraxinus excelsior aurea*), Claretash (*Fraxinus ragwoodi*).

In the vegetable garden lettuce, cabbage, broccoli, parsley, and onions can be planted and in the flower garden we can plant Spring flowering bulbs, annuals such as begonia, calendula, stock, pansy and cineraria. Perennials can be lifted, divided and replanted into enriched soil.

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Just because this is the Chinese Year of the Bull (or is it the ox?) shouldn't give any suggestion as to why I was elected President this year. However, President I am and I look forward to doing my bit to promote the organisation. Congratulations to Past President Stewart Geddes and the outgoing Committee for their efforts last year. Also, congrats to the new Committee members (listed elsewhere) especially to newcomers Laurie Pritchard and Jillian Wyke.

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Upper Beaconsfield Drainage Scheme

An independent Tribunal has recently heard the objections which were lodged in regard to the location of the "settling lagoon" in the Sutherland Road area. At this stage the outcome of the hearing is unknown.

Planning Controls - Upper Beaconsfield

For many years residents wishing to obtain planning permits have needed to gain not only a permit from the Shire of Pakenham, but also a separate permit from the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works. On occasions a permit has been granted by one authority and not granted by the other, resulting in considerable confusion and added expenditure, due to the need to lodge an appeal. In spite of the Council's constant demands to have the M.M.B.W. controls removed from the western end of the Shire, the M.M.B.W. has resisted. Currently the M.W.B.W.'s planning powers are being transferred to the Ministry of Planning, and as a result, the Council has renewed its request to eliminate the dual planning controls which exist in Upper Beaconsfield and surrounds.

Local Government Changes

Within the area of Building Permits and Control, Valuations and Weights and Measures, the power box or master control has rested with the Department of Local Government and of course the Minister for Local Government. In an announcement made recently the Premier has removed these Departments away from Local Government and transferred them to the Department of Property - Building and Services. Even though building permits and valuations will still be provided, at least at this stage, via the Local Council, the influence of Local Government and ratepayers has been lessened. Pakenham Council is extremely concerned at this trend, and is seeking assurances from the Premier as to the future existence of Local Government.

Future Funding of Fire & Emergency Services

As of today the Government advises that the net expenditure for the C.F.A. is currently provided as follows:-

- 1/3rd from Government Consolidated Fund
- 2/3rd from Levies collected by Insurances Companies.

A Government based study is suggesting that this funding base will change and it is likely that restructured funding will involve

- Owners of Property
- Owners of Motor Vehicles
- State Government

The percentage contributions have not been determined but suggestions made are

- 60% - owners of property
- 20% - owners of vehicles
- 20% - State Government

It is further proposed that the charges will be based on property values, and are likely to be added to the Council Rate notices, with the Council merely acting as a collection agency.

Council has merely been advised of these proposals, and will await the working party report.

DR. WILSON SELLS PRACTICE

"Has he really retired this time?" must be the query on many people's lips when they read that Dr. Charles Wilson sold his practice to Dr. Sally McDonald as from March 1. "No, not really" is probably the answer. For his love of helping others will surely keep him in touch with the town's medical problems for some time. To start with, after a lengthy holiday, he will take over the practice again while Dr. McDonald goes on her honeymoon, and later assist her when required.

Dr. McDonald is marrying Doug Gould, grandson of local resident Keith Ballantyne. Dr. McDonald lives in Berwick and she and her husband will continue to do so after their marriage. She will continue to run the medical practice at Wildfell during the day until she finds a location closer to the village. After-hours telephone calls go to her home.

Surgery hours are - weekdays 8.00 a.m. to 12 noon, 2.30 p.m. to 6.00 p.m.  
Saturday 8.00 a.m. to 12 noon  
Sunday 9.30 a.m. to 10.30 a.m.

Dr. John Barrell from Cranbourne runs the surgery one day a week. Dr. Barrell has had extensive experience overseas and is currently studying anaesthetics at Dandenong Hospital.

Dr. Wilson has practiced for 41 years, and established his high reputation in a range of medical fields. He and his wife, Yvonne, moved to Upper Beaconsfield seven years ago, in theory for Dr. Wilson to retire. However once at Wildfell he was soon back in the fray of attending the locals' health problems. Popular demand for his caring ways quickly had him running his practice seven days a week, on call 24 hours a day. Many a patient can gratefully remember his willing response to a frantic "after-hours" call, such as when a husband fell and gashed himself in the shower at about 11 pm, or another woke up with a dislocated shoulder at 1 am. After taking a dog-bitten child to Dr. Wilson at about 7 pm while his wife took her dog on its last trip to the vet, how many fathers can tell of a doctor who sent him home with a stitched-up child plus a restorative bottle of wine?

Having been burnt out in the Ash Wednesday fires, and survived by sitting in the swimming pool for three hours, Dr. and Mrs. Wilson quickly established themselves in a cottage at Fassifern where Dr. Wilson ran his surgery from a mobile unit. His efforts at helping the townspeople back on their feet are well known and were aptly acknowledged last November when he was made Citizen of the Year. Not only is Mrs. Wilson the most supportive wife, she is also Dr. Yvonne Russell, anaesthetist. Both she and Charles have a variety of interests other than medical which they are looking forward to pursuing. May they both enjoy a fulfilling "retirement".

Peter is survived by his widow, Susan, and son Michael.

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
