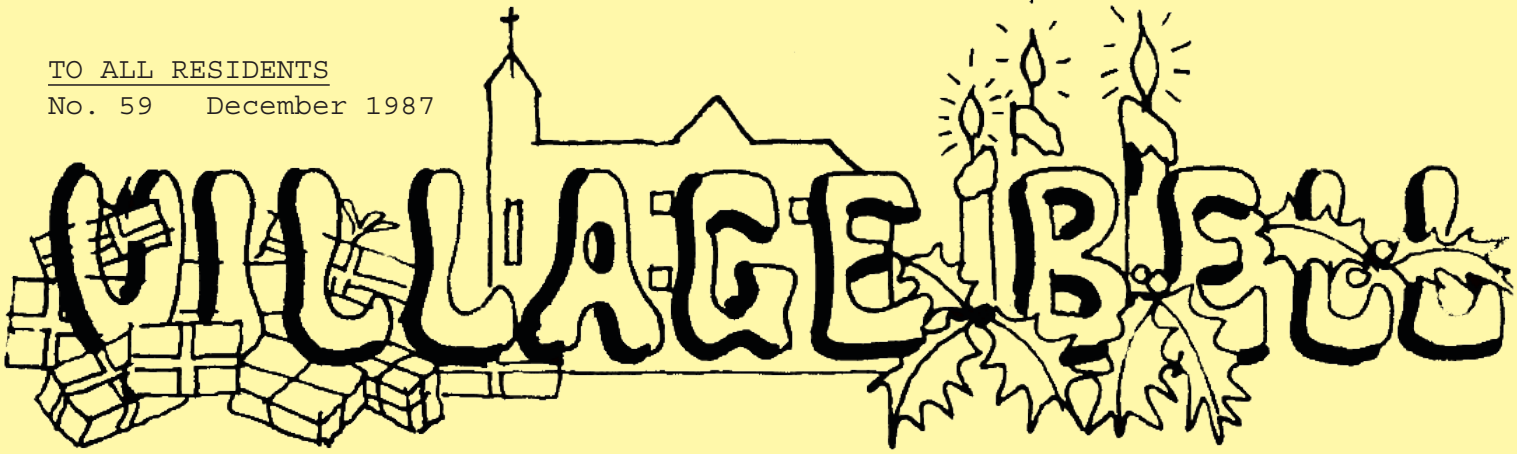

Have you read the Country Fire Authority Pamphlet which all local residents received in their mail recently? More importantly, are you taking steps to implement the suggestions in that pamphlet to protect your property during the coming bushfire season???????

Members of Upper Beaconsfield Rural Fire Brigade are always willing to give advice on how you may reduce hazards on your property, to make your place safer this summer. The card you received in the mail lists the names and phone numbers of Brigade officers. Keep this card near your phone so that in case of fire, you can ring the fire number - 443 333 immediately. On the reverse of the card you will find instructions for total fire band days and for use of incinerators.

The Brigade is always looking for new recruits, so any person in the area who is interested, in joining, is asked to contact the officers or just come along to training and they will be made most welcome.

Training is carried out on Sundays between 9.30 a.m. & 12.30 p.m. and on Wednesdays at 7.30 p.m.

In the years following the fire, George and Ann worked long hours in their growing business and as George said "if it were only for a 5 1/2 day week, we'd still be there". This year however they decided that they wanted to spend more time with their three boys. They had three potential buyers for the business but decided to sell to Laurie Fenton because they felt "he was the right man for the job".

UPPER BEACONSFIELD VILLAGE FAIR



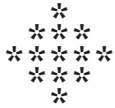
The Village Fair on Saturday, March 26th, is another popular event in the year's activities and another great opportunity for a community get-together.

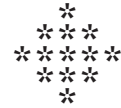

STICKER CAMPAIGN UNDER WAY

Nearly \$1000.00 has been raised so far by the Upper Beaconsfield Kindergarten and Pre-School Association through selling stickers to local businesses.

In addition to the display sticker, businesses receive acknowledgment in local papers. Initiated last year to save the Pre-School from closure, campaign proceeds this year will be split equally between the Pre-School and the Kindergarten. While the kinder has government subsidy, the pre-school for three year olds relies on fees and fund raising to cover the teacher's salary, running costs and purchases. As such it is unique in the region. The services it offers are also unique.

A trained and experienced infant teacher offers a broad range of activities and experiences which encourage the physical, emotional, intellectual, social and aesthetic areas of development in the child, helping to develop each as a total person.

Sensory and creative activities include painting, threading, building, singing cooking, problem solving, and language, movement and music games - many of which are often considered too messy or noisy for home. There is time inside and time outside to let off steam on bikes, a slide, climbing equipment and swings. Stories and discussions cover the full range of a three-year olds experiences such as family life, seasons, pets and transport.

As Anne Bate, the teacher, says, 'For many children, it is their first step into the world. I try to create a happy, caring, secure atmosphere, a home away from home, in which to introduce them to formal education'.

With 15 in each group, this first step is less traumatic than if starting in the larger kindergarten. After attending twice a week for four terms, each child usually has several good friends.

Parents are asked to help at four sessions a term. Parents usually find these 'duties' very enlightening - not only seeing their child growing to respect and like another adult apart from them but also interacting with other children. Parents also learn how to contribute more to their child and make new friends with other parents.

There are occasional outings to a farm or the shops, special visitors such as children's theatre groups, Father Christmas and the Easter Bunny, break-ups to which parents are invited to attend.

There is close liaison between the pre-school and Upper Beaconsfield Kindergarten teachers which minimises repetition and lack of challenge at kinder.

Up to the age of five is considered to be the period of a person's greatest learning potential so all three-year-olds are thought to benefit from the developmental experiences of pre-school. Those with delayed development in some area and also mature three-year-olds especially gain from a formal school.

A teacher can concentrate on lessening the weaknesses in a child as well as developing a child's strengths to the utmost. Often language, hearing and sight problems are picked up at pre-school, enabling correction to start earlier than otherwise.

Although it is independent, the Upper Beaconsfield pre-school is closely monitored by the Department of Community Services in relation to safety and health standards.

The Department's Pre-School Advisor helps plan the program to a small extent. Fees for 1988 are \$104 per term or \$4.75 a session. Enquiries may be made to Mrs. Bev. Hopkins on 03 707 5836.

In the aftermath of Ash Wednesday the Upper Beaconsfield community received many offers of help. One such offer was for a Fairford Building to be supplied by the manufacturers at half its cost. The building was immediately dubbed the "Igloo" because of the style of construction and was offered to the Shire of Pakenham to use as it saw fit.

The, Upper Beaconsfield Community Advisory Group recommended to Council that the building should be located at Upper Beaconsfield at the Recreation Reserve and asked for discussions with the Reserve Committee, School Council and local residents.

Some strong opposition to the building emerged, and through the Upper Beaconsfield Association, a public meeting was convened to have the Igloo proposal rejected. The public meeting in June 1983 however overwhelmingly endorsed the proposal to proceed with the Igloo on the Recreation Reserve.

The Igloo is officially designated as a Community Building/Fire Refuge and since its completion (almost) has been used nearly exclusively by the Scouts, Cubs, Guides and Brownies.

In an endeavour to make the building available for wider community use the Reserve Committee earlier this year proposed to Partition off sections of the main hall for use as change rooms. This proposal received a number of objections to reduction of the large open space, and the committee is currently studying, in conjunction with the Shire engineers a proposal to erect a building extension on the oval side of the Igloo which would serve as change rooms for junior football and as a replacement of the Cricket Club's longroom.

This extension would be in brick with a roof style to match the shower/toilet-sections of the existing building and would enhance the view of the Igloo from the Burton Road area.

At the same time the Committee is attempting to complete the items in the Igloo which remain unfinished.

Further details will be made available on the proposal as they become available.

The Recreation Reserve Committee accepted quotes for the concrete footings in March 1984, and Pakenham Rotary Club as convenor, assisted by Narre Warren, Berwick and Upper Beaconsfield Rotary Clubs, began erection of the Igloo shell on April 28, 1984.

At the official opening of the facilities on March 1986, the following donors were publicly thanked - Rotary clubs indicated above, voluntary labour (valued \$6,000; Dandenong Ranges Fire Affected Area Committee \$18,900; association of Apex Clubs \$13,000; Fairford Co. Dubbo, half cost of Igloo \$8,000; Australian Red Cross, Victoria, \$8000; Community donations \$2000; Save the Children fund \$500; Municipality of Beaconsfield Tasmania \$3800; City of Knox \$1600; Shire of Pakenham Loan Fund \$26,000 - a total of \$82,000.

Upper Beaconsfield Rotary Club has been most helpful in assisting with many Igloo projects over the last few years.

PERMITS FOR HEAVIER TRUCKS AND BUSES

The Federal Minister for Transport has announced that the permissible gross weight of a vehicle will be increased from 38 tonnes to 41 tonnes. This decision could have serious repercussions for Council if such an approval is extended to local roads particularly as there are a number of quarries operating within the Shire of Pakenham, Council has indicated that it is strongly opposed to these alterations.

LIQUOR CONTROL BILL 1987

New liquor control legislation lays down that extended hours for hotels will rest solely with the Liquor Control Commission, thereby bypassing the planning controls which can be implemented by Council.

Some slight alteration has been agreed to, which would enable the Council to make a submission to the Commission, but the ultimate decision will rest with the Commission and not the local people via its Council. Strong opposition has been expressed in regard to this proposal.

KITCHEN ROAD - NO TO GARBAGE COLLECTION

Residents of Kitchen Road who are currently provided with a collection point at the intersection of Split Rock Road had sought individual collections. Unfortunately the road is not adequate to enable the garbage contractor to manoeuvre his vehicle at this stage and the request has been refused.

REMOVAL OF PINE TREES

Council recently has had some applications for the removal of pine trees in the Upper Beaconsfield area and Riding Councillors are in two minds about such requests. The Conservation Group has indicated that it does not face any difficulty with the removal of pines, but of course the loss of substantial sized trees can affect not only the applicant, but also neighbours as well. Councillors will raise the matter at the next Association meeting.

HALL COMMITTEE - ANNUAL MEETING

The triennial meeting of the Upper Beaconsfield Hall Committee is to be held on December 10 1987, at which time committee members will be elected to manage the area over the next three years. As a public meeting, all are welcome to attend.

MORE TRAIL/MINI BIKES HERE

The use of trail/mini bikes in the area - often by non-residents has increased. Most of the time this riding is done illegally.. Trail/mini bikes, like all motorized vehicles, are permitted on public roads only if they are registered and carry mandatory third party insurance.

Riders must be licenced and are not permitted to ride on fire tracks. It appears that a lot of unregistered trail/mini bikes are being trailered into the area and ridden illegally.

Sooner or later, the rider, a pedestrian or a horse rider will get seriously hurt.

Being unregistered there will be no protection for the rider or the innocent party therefore we all have an obligation to try to stop this by informing the police when an illegal rider is spotted.

A lot of trail bikes are also being ridden 'off-road' which causes erosion, scares away the native animals and damages our bushland. Again, informing the police or the controlling body who looks after the land in question, is highly recommended.

Riding trail/mini-bikes on your own property might sound reasonable but it can cause great annoyance to your neighbours. In fact, you must have a council permit before riding any motorized recreational vehicle on your property, If you have neighbours who constantly ride trail/mini bikes on their property, even after you have approached them, you can contact the By-Laws Officer at the council.

PREVENTING FIRES ON YOUR BLOCK

Sue Harris - 443 815

Dr. David Packham will address the Upper Beaconsfield Conservation Group on "Fire Protection and Your Block" on Wednesday, December 9 at 8 p.m. in the Library of the Upper Beaconsfield Primary School.

Dr. Packham has been involved in bush fire research since 1962 with the C.S.I.R.O., the National Centre for Rural Fire Research and more recently with the Australian Counter Disaster College.

His studies have included fuel reduction, burning techniques and the heat characteristics of bush fires and their impact on people and property, especially in relation to human and building survival.

He will be talking about how to assess the probability of your house surviving a fire and how to raise that probability.

Dr. Packham lives locally on a bush block and has successfully balanced the need to reduce fuels while still retaining the bush nature of his block.

ASSESSING ROADSIDE RESERVES

The Upper Beaconsfield Conservation Group Inc., in conjunction with Conservation Forests and Lands (C.F. & L.) Linear Reserve Officer plan to carry out an assessment of the roadside reserves of Upper Beaconsfield.

Roadsides contribute much to our landscape experience and enjoyment of the area. They contain representative plant and animal communities (in many parts of Victoria this is all that is now left). They can act as corridors for the movement of plant and animal species and provide breeding sites and sources of food and shelter for many animals.

It's planned that pairs of volunteers will each be given a small section of Upper Beaconsfield to assess for a total of 11 values. Based on this information, an overall score can be worked out and recorded on master maps for each section of roadside.

The Quarry

One of the issues facing the communities of this area in recent years has been the continuing moves by Hillview Quarries to quarry stone on its land in Leppitt Road, in the Conservation 1 Zone.

Pakenham Council has yet to complete its Planning Scheme which is at present in two parts - Part 1 being all of the Shire with the exception of the Hillview property, which is known as Part 2.

Early last year Council entered into an agreement with Hillview, as part of these negotiations, to seek an amendment to its Planning Scheme which would allow Hillview to extract stone from the site. The proposed Planning Scheme Amendment and the Agreement were placed on public exhibition and submissions by interested parties were subsequently made to Council.

As well as a substantial number of written submissions, some sought also to be heard before Council and this took place in November 1986. Since then the considerable material involved has been processed by Council's officers and recommendations made to Council by them.

Council, in determining the issue, has sought the recommendations of an Independent Panel set up by the Minister for Planning and the Environment.

At meetings early in October Pakenham Council decided to advise the Independent Panel that the area should remain zoned Conservation 1.

Council is not obliged to accept the findings of the Independent Panel and the Minister may ultimately decide the matter.

The Independent Panel will conduct a hearing on Wednesday, 9 December 1987 at the Municipal Offices, Pakenham for those who requested to be heard in respect of their submission. Those concerned have been advised by letter.

The Quarry Impact Committee will be appearing at that Hearing and expanding on its written submission of August 1986, and the Hearing before Council of last November.
