#### HILLVIEW QUARRIES PLANNING AMENDMENT

Our last issue gave notice of the Independent Panel Hearing to be held on 9th December, 1987, at the Municipal Offices, Pakenham, concerning the Hillview Quarries application for an Amendment to the Shire Planning Scheme to allow extractive industry in the Conservation I Zone.

The meeting was attended by approximately forty interested people, including the Shire Representative, Town Planner Mr. Jeremy Wood, several Counsel and Consultants for Hillview, Quarry Impact Committee (QIC) representatives, the Conservation Group, and many objectors to the proposed Amendment.

The Independent Panel consists of three appointees by the then Minister for Planning and the Environment, Mr. Kennan. Chairman is Mr. Max Barr, a planning consultant, the other Members being Ms. Gail Robinson with considerable experience in similar panels and committees, and Mr. Ken McKenzie, a practising engineer.

Following a move for an adjournment on the part of Hillview, on the grounds that they needed more time to update material with consultants, to exchange material with all parties, and to digest this material, the hearing developed into a procedural meeting which determined a timetable leading up to the hearing in June 1988.

Those who indicated that they wished to appear at that hearing have since been advised that :

- \* Hillview Quarries Pty. Ltd. has until 31st March, 1988 to make available to all parties copies of its submissions. Copies of this material will be available at the Municipal Offices for consideration by submitters.
- \* Reports/Submissions by Pakenham Shire and all Government Agencies are to be made available on 31st March also.
- \* ALL OTHER SUBMITTERS ARE TO PROVIDE MATERIAL TO THE PARTIES BY NO LATER THAN MONDAY, 16th MAY, 1988.
- \* The Hearing is planned to begin at the Council Chambers on Monday, 6th June, 1988, and a continuous period of two weeks has been allocated. One evening session will be included.
- \* An inspection of the area is to be undertaken on 29th March, 1988, from 2.00 p.m. and those parties proposing to attend the inspection should contact the Shire Planner, Mr. Wood, by Monday, 21st March, 1988.

A very important aspect that has been determined is that although the hearing is currently limited to those submitters who have already been confirmed ANYONE who wishes to make a LATE submission on the matter may do so by application direct to the Minister for Planning and the Environment, the Hon. Mr. Tom Roper.

This is of particular importance to those new arrivals in the area who have not had the opportunity to voice their concerns, and others who have reviewed their outlook and now wish to participate.

The same timetabling considerations apparently will apply to any new submissions, so anyone who is interested should make their application as soon as possible.

Two Planning matters will be advertised shortly.

\* The Country Residential extension on relevant properties near the intersection of Stoney Creek & Albers Roads will be proposed for a minimum subdivision of 2 hectares.

\* A Golf Range is proposed for the property adjacent to the Montuna Golf Course, on privately owned land.

If you desire to comment, watch for details in local papers.

The first Council meeting for the year will be held on 1st February when the local Australia Day awards will be announced.

Riding Boundary Changes? The Government policy requires an equal population in each Riding. Because Iona is marginally down and Ranges is marginally up, we are obliged to consider enlarging the physical size of Iona to increase the population, at a cost to the Ranges Riding. Residents of the two areas will be invited shortly to submit their comments in writing to the Shire Secretary.

Democratically you can appreciate the reason for the policy, but in a developing municipality such as Pakenham I wonder if the margin variation is large enough. The present indications are boundary changes will be a regular event, causing added confusion to the residents.

The year seems to have been a long one !

VILLAGE FAIR - The Fair was conducted by the U.B.A. Sub-committee and again was a very popular and successful event. Congratulations to Kaylene Crook and her hard-working team who put it all together. For the small community the size and complexity of the Fair and its attendant procession in quite a task and a very impressive result!

INCORPORATION of the Association was achieved during the year after we satisfied the exacting requirements of the Corporate Affairs Office. Thank you, Trevor Harrison.

VILLAGE BELL - A new model Gestetner duplicator was purchased from the Uniting Church, South Melbourne, and it has made life slightly easier for our willing part-time printers, George & Judy Moir, to whom we owe a great debt of gratitude. During the Village Bell year, they print over 120,000 sheets for us - all in their spare time, and often in the late hours. We are also indebted to the Editors, typists, collating groups, artists, contributors, to Julie & Ray Alsop for their assistance in many ways, and lastly to the R. S. L. for use of their premises.

QUARRY - The U.B.A. have again been actively supporting the Quarry Impact Committee and have been keeping residents aware of the on-going moves by Hillview Quarries to have land in Leppitt Road re-zoned to enable extractive industry. (see page 3)

PASSING LANE ON EMERALD ROAD - Shire have approved passing lanes on the winding steep sections of Emerald Road above Guys Hill, but withdrawal of road-making funds by Government ruled it out this financial year - the same fate happened to the completion of Emerald Road re-construction.

RE-ZONING OF LAND TO COUNTRY RESIDENTIAL - A considerable amount of time was spent by the U.B.A. and in particular by its Planning Sub-committees in examining the Shire's re-zoning of U.B. land. The Sub-committee members were concerned primarily with the effect of sub-division close to the Stoney Creek - and recommended a minimum of 5 acre sizes in that area.

TOWNSHIP PLANNING - Plenty of talk and not much movement has occurred in this area. A difference of opinion between local authorities and owners of the General Store property over one way traffic has held up the action.

CAROLS BY CANDLELIGHT 1987 - This major village event was again greatly enjoyed by the large crowd of residents who attended in spite of somewhat inclement weather. Our thanks to Greg Ross who was once more our very able compere, to John Barkla who provided the music, Murray Erwin who organised it and the Rotary Club of Upper Beaconsfield who provided the carol sheets.

An event like this requires many helpers and we were fortunate also to have the help of Royce Thomson, Roy Harris, Roy Perry, Ray Ratcliff, Stuart Geddes, Ern Adamson, Barry Medwin and Andrew Rowe. The C.F.A. organised Father Christmas and the parking.

Many favourable comments and a few questions have prompted this account of our very new and attractive park adjacent to the tennis courts in Salisbury Road.

When the land became available for purchase in 1979 our Riding representatives persuaded the Council to write to local organisations asking if they thought it should be bought for public use. The answers resulted in the purchase of the block by Council.

The Village Bell of 1983 carried a full page plan of the block laid out as a park for public use - this design and proposal was made by Mr. Eric Bumpstead. Two weeks later we had Ash Wednesday and the block became the site of the post-fire Kindergarten - a temporary building was placed there.

In the Village Bell of October '84, Eric again proposed a park, but this time a Memorial Park. This use was accepted by Council and residents alike and a Committee of Management was formed comprising a Council representative - Councillor Keith Ewenson - and representatives of the U.B.A. and the Citizens of the Year. Many Working Bees have resulted in this attractive and functional memorial to the 21 people who lost their lives, and a reminder of the loss of 180 homes, St. John's Church, the General Store, Hotel, Kindergarten, Service Station, Scout Camp and a multitude of other losses suffered by residents.

The Committee is most grateful for the generous help it has received from many sources including the Shire of Pakenham providing the land, and other assistance, the City of Berwick for a generous gift of shrubs, and Mr. Haydon Merry for the gift of the name-board for the park, the Rotary Club of Upper Beaconsfield who provided and installed the Memorial Plaque and also financed the watering system, Kerr's Quarries who supplied stone, donations from Des McKenna, Marie Howard, Roger Francey, Brian Dickinson, George & Ann Decelis, the Beaconsfield C.F.A. who donated two ferns, and Warren Park Nurseries for geranium plants.

The two C.W.A. branches, the Upper Beaconsfield and the Woorinyan branch, generously provided sufficient money to have park furniture made and installed by the Committee. It comprises two picnic tables - each built with two bench seats, and a separate bench at the far end of the park - all are set in concrete bases.

### IMPORTANT REMINDERS FROM THE FIRE BRIGADE

Recent hot weather has made us all aware of the increased risk of bushfires. By now all residents should have made their properties as safe as possible from fires, i.e. clearing of undergrowth near buildings, cleaning spoutings, etc. etc.

During the Fire Danger Period, NO FIRES MAY BE LIT IN THE OPEN -this includes burning of small heaps of leaves, twigs, etc.

Lighting of solid-fuel barbecues on Total Fire Ban Days is illegal. Included in this category are ALL barbecues containing HEAT BEADS.

We now have a new sign (courtesy Andrew Rowe) which will be displayed on Total Fire Ban Days at the corner of St. Georges & Emerald Roads alerting people to the declaration of a day of Total Fire Ban.

In those areas where street numbers have been allocated by the Shire, some residents are not displaying their correct street number. In the event of a fire or other emergency, five minutes delay spent searching for a particular house could have serious consequences.

TREE HOLLOWS - HOMES FOR NATIVE FISH.

Hollow logs - submerged ones - are needed by several species of native fish for breeding. Their eggs are laid inside the log and often these may be guarded by the male till hatched. Unfortunately, many rivers and streams, originally choked with fallen trees, have been cleared in the name of stream 'improvement' and are now no more than fast-flowing gutters.

This has led to the elimination of many native fish from a large number of Victoria's watercourses. Only when you read accounts (from the turn of the century) of wagon loads of four and five foot cod being taken from the Yarra River do you realise what we have lost. (Is this another fisherman's tale? Ed.)

It is possible, however, to stock farm dams with native fish if the right conditions are met. Only larger dams - greater than 40 metres of shore line - are big enough to support viable numbers. The dam will need to be at least 1.5 metres deep at one point, to provide a cool retreat in the heat of summer.

Planting trees will provide additional shade and aquatic vegetation -transplant some from a nearby swamp, and it will soon multiply -will create a diverse ecosystem, providing all the food your fish require. Hollow logs are necessary for some species to breed, but fish are not fussy, and will utilise polythene or terracotta pipes, The more your dam resembles a natural wetland, the more animal life it will attract.

Native fish fry is usually available from January to April and will take 2-3 years to reach eating size. Fish fry, and more information, is available from the Fisheries & Wildlife Department of Conservation, Forest & Lands.

THE LATE NELL McTAGGART

Mrs. Nell McTaggart was a war widow when she moved to Upper Beaconsfield with her daughter Margaret Howard, son-in-law Monty and their four children in 1954.

Nell was an able craftswoman and a good cook and homemaker and assisted with the family management while Margaret was working as a full-time physiotherapist.

Nell was an active member of St, John's Church from the time of her arrival and in the early 1960's, together with Mrs. Joyce Park, established a junior and a senior bible class.

A few years later she used her experience in craft work to teach a group of teen-age girls called "Discoverers" to make articles for an annual sale at St, Paul's Chapter House to raise money to assist missionaries. Some of her pupils were awarded prizes for excellence. This continued until 1971. At this time she was also one of Pam Darling's assistants at the Berwick Library.

In the early 1970's she fractured her hip. This severely limited her movements but did not stop her from gardening and caring for her greenhouse and orchids. Later as her sight failed she made delightful toys which gave much pleasure to many children.

She remained an active member of St. John's Church and also enjoyed the companionship of a local craft group as long as she was able,

Nell was sick for many months but faced her problem with intelligence, courage and cheerfulness. She died in the Royal

Melbourne Hospital on 29th November, 1987, aged 88 years.

## THE OLD ORCHARDS OF UPPER BEACONSFIELD

What tourists are to the Gold Coast, and mines are to Broken Hill, the orchards once were to Upper Beaconsfield. They extended from Dewhurst (now submerged under the Cardinia Reservoir) in the north, to Paynes Road in the south, and they spread eastward to Kitchen's huge commercial orchards in the Toomuc Valley.

Picture the village as it used to be from the 1890's onwards, when the village street was just a short section near the Store, and the only road to Emerald was the present Stoney Creek Road. The orchards, began right in the village at Halford Street, and from there to the Recreation Reserve the road was bordered by uninterrupted acres of fruit trees. The only break was King's house, later Esdaile's, opposite the present Paul Grove. It was only in 1924 that the winding section of Emerald Road, (known, we are told, as "Martin's Folly"), was cut through from the village street to "Faldinghurst".

The orchardists tried various crops. Pears, walnuts, lemons, cherries and plums were grown, but apples were the main crop. The harvest kept the village flat out from the Gravenstein season in January until the Yates variety in April, picking, packing and transporting packs to the railway station. The rest of the year was busily occupied in planting, pruning, thinning, fertilising, spraying, and preparing the ground and trees for the next crop.

New roads were built to facilitate the carriage of fruit to Beaconsfield and Officer Railway Stations. The portion of Emerald Road mentioned above, a part of Albers Road, and the 'granite ridge' road, to Leppitt Road, were among them. A short cut was planned from "Faldinghurst" to the Officer Road, but the only portion ever made was the present McKenzie Road.

The story of the orchards is worth recording for contemporary readers and for posterity. Two knowledgeable and well-known orchardists, Eric Bumpstead and Don Begg, commenced the task, and octogenarian John Glismann took the history back to earlier days.

All of the material collected cannot sensibly be compressed into one issue of the Village Bell. So that it can be recorded as comprehensively as possible, it will be continued in future issues.



Pine trees are part of the Upper Beaconsfield environment. Huge, venerable specimens dot our landscape planted by an older generation as reminders of home and as shelter belts for stock. They now serve as our reminder of Upper Beaconsfield's past.

More recently, a few plantations of *Pinus Radiata* have been developed for commercial purposes.

Pine trees though, do have their drawbacks. They burn well in bushfires, particularly when in large plantations. They readily self-sow along roadsides and into the bush, and, as they are introduced plants they are not palatable to our native animals (except yellow-tail black cockatoos), may out-compete native plants, and when mature, shade-out any understory such as local herbs, grasses and orchids.

At present a permit is needed to remove any tree even if it is a 'pest' plant in our bushland.

There will be a discussion on pine trees at the next meeting of the Upper Beaconsfield, Association.
