**COUNCIL NOTES.**

**Elections.**

Elections will be held in Beacon Hills and Toomuc Ridings. All the usual Council polling places will be used. Although this time Beacon Hills residents will not be able to vote at Cockatoo. The joint use of Cockatoo for Ranges and Beacon Hills was tried on the last election and as a result, it was resolved not to do it this time. It was hard to justify the manpower required.

**Road Problems.**

We regularly voice concern with the diminishing purse for roading solutions and rightly so, but just recently the engineer showed the Riding Councillors a map of Upper Beaconsfield and it showed that a highly significant number of roads had been reconstructed in the last ten years. This does not mean we are complacent, we continue to address the problems as best we can.

**Environment Strategy.**

From the reports to Council, it is shaping up well in most fields. From talking to Sue Harris, the Co-ordinator, there is still a need in the heritage aspect of the strategy. This is a significant area where the skills of many Upper Beaconsfield people could be applied with wonderful results. How about it you writers and historians? Contact Sue for further details.

**Ex-Pakenham Water Board Property.**

The Shire have recently purchased the ex-Pakenham Water Board property at 66-68 Main Street, Pakenham. In the long term, it will be used for community facilities and in the short term, approval has been given for the property to be leased to the State Electoral Office. When a state election is called, the administration for the Pakenham district will be from this venue.

**WHAT'S HAPPENING AT COUNCIL.**

**Elections.**

Yes, on Saturday, 1st August, 1992, elections will be held, for the Beaconhills Riding. Voting is compulsory, and will be held at the Upper Beaconsfield Primary School. Candidates are Peter Meeking and Don New, with one to be elected.

**Helmeted Honeyeater.**

The Friends of the Helmeted Honeyeater recently presented to Council, advising that, with favourable conditions, the total number of remaining birds had now settled to around 70. The task to prevent extinction was on-going, with a limited but direct involvement now available from the Healesville Sanctuary. There was an urgent need to obtain the services of a part-time professional to assist the project and funds were being sought. The request is to be considered by Council in the forthcoming budget.

**Compost Bins - Kindergarten.**

To assist the recycling process, Council has agreed to provide Kindergartens with a compost bin at no cost as part of a reviewed policy.

**Youth Unemployment.**

Council is continuing to pursue employment options for those persons within the Shire who have been unable to gain employment, particularly as there is a report that youth unemployment in Victoria could be as high as 46%. We have endeavoured to obtain details of the unemployed within each township within the Shire, but we are told that this information is not available.

Council has resolved to participate in a Jobskills programme, and four positions are likely to be created. Council is also looking at the possibility of both providing on-job training to volunteers, and to employ a number of other junior persons to "shadow" existing staff.

**Disaster Exercise.**

As Chairman of the Pakenham Shire Disaster Planning Committee, it is pleasing to advise that a major disaster exercise is to be held in the Shire of Pakenham later this year. Although it was my personal wish to have the Upper Beaconsfield community tested in this exercise, thereby helping us all to be better prepared for any future bushfire, some strong community opposition to this proposal has resulted in the exercise being transferred to Maryknoll. Already a meeting has been held with the community of Maryknoll and letters have been forwarded to residents offering to fully participate in the exercise, even to the point of testing the evacuation procedures.

Horse Riding Trail - Toomuc Valley Road to R. J. Chambers Reserve.

At the request of the Council's Horse Riding Trails Committee, Council has now agreed to apply to Melbourne Water for funds from the Metropolitan Improvement Fund, to be added to Shire Funds (Beaconhills Riding) so as to establish a riding trail from Toomuc Valley Road to the Chambers Reserve.

CRITCHLEY PARKER JUNIOR RESERVE SURVEYED BY MAMMAL GROUP.

The Mammal Survey Group recently spent a weekend at Critchley Parker Junior Reserve. They are a remarkably well organized group of volunteers who for many years now have been spending one weekend a month at different sites across Victoria, investigating indigenous fauna. The group had a permit to trap from the Department of Conservation and Environment.

At Critchley Parker, one hundred and twelve live traps were set on the Saturday night, then checked early on the Sunday morning. The success rate was excellent - 19 little marsupial antechinus (A. stuartii), 13 native bush rats (R. fuscipes) and 3 native swamp rats (R. lutreolus) as well as 13 ringtail possums spotted. The survey group members were surprised that the trapping rate was so high and that no introduced rats or mice were caught. Considering the reserve is surrounded by houses, domestic cats and dogs, this is indeed good to know. The results are equal to those gained from remote bushland areas.

You will be pleased to know that each animal was released in exactly the same spot from which it was captured and that these indigenous species, unlike the introduced ones, do not enter houses and make a nuisance of themselves. They live in and feed off the bush. Results will be sent to the Arthur Rylah Institute to be added to the Atlas of Victorian Wildlife data bank.

C.P.R

Sixteen people, volunteers and other members of the community, took part in an exercise run by the Royal Life Saving Society to update our C.P.R. (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation). These updates are required every two years to keep your certificate current and it is remarkable how readily one can forget the timing required to be used in such emergencies. Let's hope we never have to make use of our knowledge but it is good to know that one is able to be of assistance should the need arise.

Referrals.

Calls for our group's services from the community have increased by 44% for the first five months of 1992 compared to the same time last year. Perhaps this is a sign of additional stress in our community, but also perhaps that the community is becoming more aware of how we can help. Most requests have been for assistance in family need situations and in transport.

Review.

We are grateful to Janet Cropley, Community Development Officer - Shire of Pakenham, for helping us to conduct a review of our operations recently. The Committee felt that in our fourth year of operation, it was prudent to evaluate where we had come and where we were heading in the future. This has been a very worthwhile exercise and a number of specific changes have been made and are in the process of implementation.

We will advise the community progressively on these matters.

Retirement.

With great sadness our Group recently received advice from Rev. Peter George that he was withdrawing from his active role on our co-ordinating team due to health considerations. Peter was the Chairman of the initial public meeting which set up the Steering Committee in August 1988 which led to the formation of the Group in March 1989. Peter has been one of the main sources of inspiration and guidance since that time and we sincerely thank him on behalf of the community and wish he and Fay every blessing for their future.

## NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH.

A sub-committee of the Upper Beaconsfield Association has been preparing plans for a survey of residents to ascertain whether there is community backing for a Neighbourhood Watch scheme in Upper Beaconsfield.

The survey would be carried out over the period from 29th August to 13th September, and if there is sufficient indication of support, the Committee will call a public meeting to launch the scheme and appoint a permanent committee and office bearers to get it up and running.

Should you be called upon to help with the survey, the U.B.A. would appreciate your assistance in this important community project.

Sub-maps of each area have been prepared and two people are being asked to work together to survey approximately 30 homes.

Neighbourhood Watch has been proven as being effective in reducing the incidence of household robberies, etc. in cities and towns around Victoria, and the program has other valuable spin-offs for the community as side-benefits.

Do you own a property with native bushland and vegetation which you would like to see protected and preserved for the future -long after you have put your cue in the rack?

Perhaps a Conservation Covenant with the Victorian Conservation Trust could be the answer you are looking for.

The enormous loss of native vegetation, together with the resultant destruction of habitat for our native fauna is of great concern throughout Australia and evident right here in the Pakenham Shire.

A Covenant is a practical way of making a contribution to the retention of valuable native bushland. A Conservation Covenant is an agreement entered into by a landowner with the Victorian Conservation Trust. Once the terms of the Covenant have been agreed upon, it is registered on the Title and will bind future owners of the land. The agreement is entirely voluntary and is drawn up in order to achieve the Conservation objectives of the landowner. The Trust can assist with expert advice and planning in order to achieve those objectives for the particular areas.

Covenants can be arranged excluding part of the property such as domestic areas around the home and outbuildings, thus providing the landowner with a considerable degree of flexibility. Covenants also provide a means by which a group of owners can band together to seek conservation of a particular habitat or feature which may extend across individual property boundaries. If and when the time comes to sell the property, it is likely to attract a potential owner interested in nature conservation.

Should you wish to learn more about Conservation Covenants, come along to the next meeting of the Upper Beaconsfield Conservation Group on Wednesday, 12th August, when Mr. Rod Satstrom, who is the Covenant Programme Manager with the Victorian Conservation Trust will be the Guest Speaker.

The meeting is held at the Upper Beaconsfield Community Centre -commencing 8.00 p.m. Supper will be provided and all are welcome.



The shortest route to Melbourne's eastern suburbs from the proposed Hillview quarry site would be from the Bathe Road exit, via Leppitt Road and Salisbury Road to the Upper Beaconsfield village and across the newly surfaced Albers Road, Manestar Road and Boundary Road to Wellington Road.

We all need to be aware of the impact a quarry could have on Upper Beaconsfield. An inquiry into planning issues for extractive industries is now taking place and a submission by the Q.I.A. has been presented.

A panel hearing into Hillview's application for an extractive minerals zoning could take place at any time and we must be prepared. In addition to the regular routine work involved in providing a "professional" volunteer fire service to Upper Beaconsfield, several officers have recently being active at higher levels of the CFA.

Captain Eric Bumpstead is a member of the working party, undertaking a major review of the Shire of Pakenham Municipal Fire Prevention Plan.

**RURAL ROAD NUMBERS FOR SHIRE.**

Ray Ratcliff.

The Shire of Pakenham have just notified the Village Bell of a new system of rural road numbering being implemented at present.

The system was designed by Noel Edgerton who was employed by the Shire of Corio and the scheme won a National Award in 1987.

At present, the vague rural lot numbering system causes much waste of time for people who service the rural area - e.g. Doctors, police, taxi-drivers, carriers, tradespeople, contractors, emergency services, etc. and lots of arm-raising and head-scratching for residents who are asked for help.

The Rural Numbering System will be a consistent and permanent means of property identification and its effectiveness has been proven in many rural shires in Victoria.

Rural Numbering is spaced according to distance of 10 for every 100 metres so that every displayed number becomes a signpost as well as a property identification.

Fieldwork and allocation of numbers is in progress - and a letter with explanation should reach rural residential owners by late September. Reflective numbers will be forwarded free by mail and absentee owners can receive them free of charge by request.

Shire of Pakenham will then have some 21,000 rural numbered properties.

**QUARRY IMPACT COMMITTEE.**

A recent Age newspaper advertisement inviting submissions from interested people to a multi-party government committee called "Natural Resources and Environment Committee" was noticed by the Quarry Impact Committee and the hearing was considered an important opportunity to put our case for a government rethink of strategy in relation to the granting of quarry licences.

Several of our Committee members prepared excellent submissions and these submissions were presented to the hearing on Friday, 10th July.

The submissions showed that the estimates supplied to the government for hard rock future requirements were grossly overstated and that, in fact, present licensed reserves were sufficient for the Melbourne region for at least 50 years.

This fact was used by the Q.I.A. presentees to good effect before the parliamentary committee and they made a strong case for freezing any new licences for hard rock quarries until a satisfactory strategy plan was arrived at.

The presenters quoted from State Government Urban Development production "Shaping Victoria's Future - A Place to Live" (April 1991) "that the South Eastern corridor will reach maturity within the next 20 years, and the government policy focuses then on longer term growth to north and west of Melbourne, including regional outers of Geelong, Ballarat and Bendigo".

This reference to long term urban planning underlined the need for strategic planning of resources for the whole Melbourne region and much new food for thought was given to the parliamentary committee members.

Congratulations to Roger Holloway and Fedir and Johanneke Woskoboenko for their expertise in preparing these detailed submissions at short notice and their skill in presenting their cases before this top level Committee.

Thanks also to the many other residents who forwarded submission to the Parliamentary hearing.
