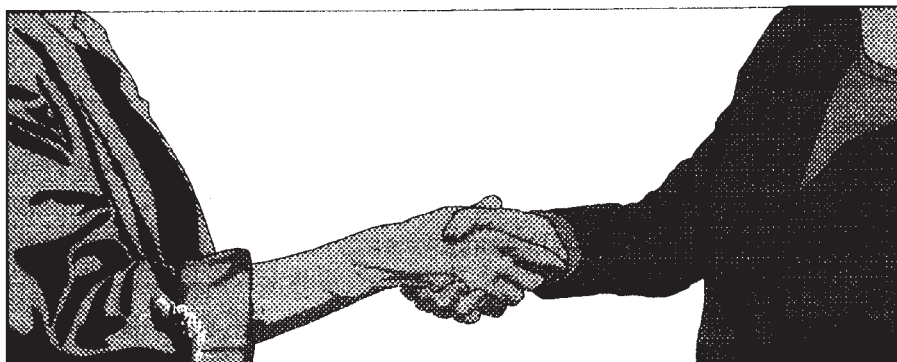

## WHAT'S HAPPENING IN SALISBURY ROAD?

Cardinia Shire Corporate Manager of Planning, Mr John McCaffrey was the guest speaker at the well attended Christmas meeting of the U.B.A.

The proposed changes to Salisbury Road were displayed in plan and elevation, showing the new road will be considerably wider than the present one which is well below modern day standards in formation and pavement width.

Concern was expressed that several mature trees would have to be removed, and might include the lovely old gum on the south side of the road. Unfortunately this tree is only a little more than half a metre from the pavement which means almost half its root system is under the road. The Council is seeking expert advice to determine if there is any practical way to save the tree and **continued on page 2**

# Fire Safe - Are your appliances safe???

By this time of the year we should have all attended to those chores around the home in preparation for Summer and the bushfire season. Ideally we have cleaned up, planned, talked about the threat and our proposed actions, rehearsed some of the tasks and in general are ready to respond to bushfire should the threat become reality.

Inside our homes smoke alarms should have been installed and note taken of various areas that need attention such as getting the flue/chimney cleaned over the next couple of months. We are all aware of the danger of faulty electrical cords and appliances and if damage occurs then we have repairs earned out or replace the offending item.

BUT are we all aware of the possible dangers that exist with our appliances due to inherent manufacture problems. Our newspapers are carrying increasing numbers of recall and warning notices in respect to everyday appliances we use in our homes.

I recently visited a home fitted with one such appliance and in conversation discovered the occupants were vaguely aware of the recall but since theirs was a fairly new appliance, considered it did not apply to them **WRONG!**

The Brigade received two recall notices in December extracts of which follow:

**VULCAN AND PYROX GAS HEATERS** -the "following gas heaters with the date of recall going back to April 1984.

QUASAR GAS HEATER

-Model 26.5

PYROX GAS HEATER

- Model Gemini

The defect is that the door switches may enable water to enter the holder for the door switch with the result that an electrical short may occur.

If you have any of these appliances then do not use them until you have contacted the manufacturer and are satisfied that they have been thoroughly checked and are free of defect.

## Joy's Spirit Lives On

'Joy was magnificent'. These words spoken by Reverend Tom Stokes capture the sentiment of family and friends gathered at St John's Church on Friday 5 January to farewell Joy Rose.

Joy died peacefully in hospital on New Year's Eve. Five months earlier, after being hospitalised with cancer and given only a short time to live, Joy revealed enormous determination by returning home a few days later. During the following months she discovered not only faith and courage to face her approaching death with dignity but also the ability to teach others that it is possible to approach the future, no matter what it holds, without fear. People were drawn to Joy and uplifted by her wonderful spirit, openness and warmth.

Joy and her husband, Peter, and children, Robert and Jemima, moved from Sydney to Upper Beaconsfield in January, 1992, attracted by the bush-like surroundings reminiscent of their bushwalking days. Joy also sensed the Upper Beacy community spirit and quickly became involved in community affairs. Her zest for life was evident in everything she undertook from a diversity of crafts at which she excelled to the extraordinarily comprehensive family history she compiled over a number of years, complete with family anecdotes and legends. In her work as a temp with companies in the Dandenong area Joy's ease with people and great organisational skills enabled her to step into any position and pick up the threads with assurance. In no time she had 'difficult people eating out of her hands! But despite all these interests her family was

always number one in her life.

Over the last five months of her life she set goals and constantly challenge herself to reach one more milestone: Jemima's birthday, the wedding anniversary shared with Peter, Christmas. She made detailed lists and methodically worked through them, planning her family's future, tackling one problem after another. In fact, in her thirty-nine years, Joy probably achieved more than many in a life span of twice that length.

Those of us who were privileged to spend time with Joy during her last months have shared a journey that will touch us for life.

We have an annual fee of \$16. per family.

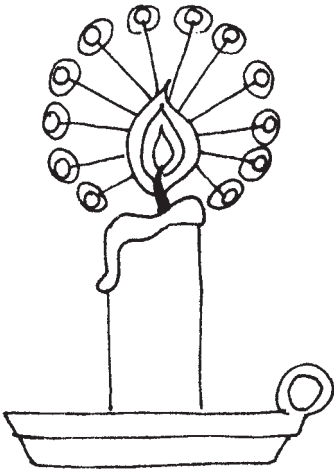
The Toy Library is looking for new committee members to help us to keep the

## Cricket Club Update

With the season at the half-way mark, Upper Beaconsfield Cricket Club's thirds look like the only senior team likely to play in this year's finals. Playing in E Grade and captained by Rob Hansen, after six completed rounds the thirds are undefeated and on top of the ladder. The other two senior sides, playing in A Grade and B Grade, are yet to win a game this season, but hopefully success will come in the second half of the year. The junior sides have enjoyed moderate success, with Under 16 winning one game so far this season, and the Under 14s two.

The Club recruited well during the off-season, with many new faces arriving and some old faces returning. The Club has still maintained its youth policy, which sees quite a number of junior players playing at senior level, many of them playing juniors on Saturday morning, then seniors in the afternoon. It's great to see this sort of commitment to the game from the younger players.

Off the field, the committee has been busy raising funds. This year the Club has a player sponsorship scheme, whereby players are sponsored by businesses, family, and friends. This has resulted in a player sponsors board, with the player's photo and playing statistics, being established. All player sponsors will be invited to a special Sponsors' Night function which will be held towards the end of the season. Several local businesses, including

the General Store and Carol Gibson Pharmacy, are sponsoring a player, and players are encouraged to support those businesses. The Club has also been involved in selling tickets for the Victorian Cricket Association raffle which has excellent prizes, and will see the Club making a handsome profit. The annual \$1000 Night, again organised by Richard Edwards, was held just before Christmas, and also raised much needed funds.



Club statistician, Bob Taylor, has been spending his holidays compiling a list of current players' statistics, including runs made, wickets taken, and catches held. He also produced a list of players' milestones achieved so far this season, and those which should be achieved before the season's end. These will make very interesting reading.

Socially, two very well attended barbecues were held after matches in the pre-Christmas period and it is hoped more will be held later in the year. They are an excellent opportunity for players and their families to get together.

At the end of the season, the Noblet Award Night and the Presentation Night will both be held. The Noblet Award is awarded to the best player across all three senior grades and is named in honour of a local cricketer who was killed in his youth back in the 1950s. Presentation Night sees a trophy being awarded to the best player in each grade, while also recognising other personal achievements such as centuries and hat-tricks.

Junior co-ordinator, Peter Bull, has been busy promoting the game of cricket within the local community. A cricket clinic was held at the Recreation Reserve in conjunction with the Primary School. This was followed shortly after with the first session of Vic Hit, which was attended by eleven youngsters aged from seven to eleven. The program concentrates on the basic skills of cricket in an interesting format, and will hopefully yield players for the Club's future.

All members of the community are welcome to come down to the Recreation Reserve to watch 'your team' in action. Matches at the Rec. Reserve on Saturday afternoons alternate between A Grade and B Grade. You are also most welcome to come along and support E Grade in their finals campaign.

The Annual report highlighted recent achievements following the reconstruction of the oval and erection of the igloo after the 1983 bushfire. ## THE FUTURE ROLE OF COUNCILLORS

Following Municipal elections in March 1997, Councillors will represent ratepayers once more.

In its report on the roles and functions of Councillors, the Local Government Board made specific recommendations for a Code of Conduct for Councillors. A draft code has been prepared by the Municipal Association of Victoria which addresses the standard expected by Councillors by the communities they represent.

In relation to the role of Councillors the code states:

The role of a Councillor is to represent the community and take into account the community's views in formulating policy - it is not a management role.

The Councillor, together with his/her colleagues as the Council, determines the corporate plan of the Council, decides the corporate structure to support it, adopts the budget and declares the rate.

Their collective role extends to the setting of strategies to achieve corporate objectives, reviewing progress and checking the achievement of the corporate performance targets including those of the Chief Executive Officer.

It does not extend to the management of staff which is the role of the C.E.O. and his/her senior staff.'

Given the effects of government reforms and the new responsibilities of elected representatives, it is apparent that training oppor-

tunities for intending candidates would be desirable, if not essential. Monash University, through its Graduate School of Government now offers a 'Preparatory Training for Local Government Candidates' Course.

1995 has seen some patchy flowering efforts from many of the wildflowers, although golden moth orchids were magnificent in spring, and fringe lilies have been magical on sunny days during November and December.

Hundreds of blue sun orchids were in bud, but only one day during their normal flowering period was hot enough for them to open. Just as well that they are self pollinating!

To compensate for this perhaps, a new orchid record for Upper Beaconsfield was sent to the Herbarium in November. There it has been pickled and added to their collection as *Pterostylis atrans*. This orchid was previously listed under *Pterostylis obtusa* and is usual noticed flowering during January/February in the Eastern Highlands and Dandenong Ranges National Park.

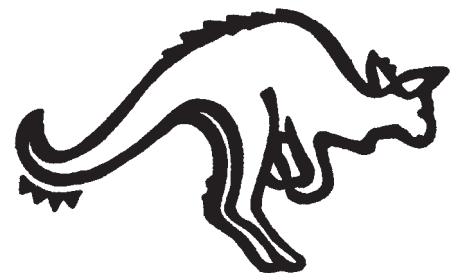
## JOEYS COMING SOON TO UPPER BEAC?

## FIRE AT HAMILTON RESERVE

The fire, which was deliberately lit by the Upper Beaconsfield Rural Fire Brigade and condoned by the Upper Beaconsfield Conservation Group, was cheered on by the members of a Fireguard group and residents from nearby houses.

Motivation for the slow burn on December 27 1995 was fuel reduction in the lower section of the reserve. For this reason, flames from briskly burning wire grass were allowed to run up tree trunks to rid them of loose or fibrous bark. As on previous occasions, boundaries of the designated patch were lit first, and the fire was allowed to burn in the centre. Fire fighters stood guard with hose

and knapsack sprays, but calm weather conditions kept the exercise problem free.



Early in the exercise, Captain Bumpsted organised a demonstration of efficient and effective use of knapsack sprays. Ideally fire fighters work in threes with knap-

sacks. They move in Indian file at a brisk walking pace parallel to the rear of the fire. When it gets too hot for the lead person, that person retires to last in line to continue spraying. The audience was amazed at the sudden death of the fire when the spray was directed at the base of the flames instead of on top. This knowledge could be invaluable if that burnoff you are planning tries to get away!

Several times during the year, the Conservation Group will conduct plant surveys as part of continuing research into effects of fire on the ecology which is being undertaken in the reserve.

We thank the UBRFB for their willing and cheerful co-operation in this project.

## ***Some Thoughts and Thanks to John and Terry Milligan***

John Milligan's very gracious letter of thanks in the last Village Bell, caused many of us to reflect on the extent of John and Terry's twenty years of service to the Upper Beaconsfield community. The following is an outline of their contributions and why they are held in such high regard.

John and Terry arrived in Australia in 1953. John, a very experienced and able automotive engineer had come to join the management of Lucas Industries Aust.

In 1958 they bought a 30 acre property in Hughenden Road intending to retire here. Deciding to farm the property, they worked hard sowing their five paddocks to pasture for fattening beef cattle. John admits he is no farmer, but thanks to help they received from local people, they were successful.

When John retired from Lucas in 1974, he had a hip joint replacement. The following year they built their house and moved to Upper Beaconsfield where they were already involved in local activities, including the Historical Society.

Local identity Beryl Hails, who was the Secretary of the Upper Beaconsfield Association persuaded the Milligans to become members. John was rather surprised to find himself elected President in 1976. Beryl and John decided to ask all village groups to participate in a community "Activities Day". A very successful meeting was held on 20th March 1976. This event later became the Village Fair.

John was again President in 1977. Each year he was President, John wrote a "Newsletter to Members" which he delivered by hand, quite a task.

Following his example and aiming to have local news in

every household, the next President Roger Francey, initiated the production of the Village Bell on July 1st 1978. John became a major contributor, combining with Roy Harris and Diana Rocke to produce a well written and researched historical article in most of the early issues. These articles form the backbone of an Upper Beaconsfield history which will be written one day.

Having displayed his talents, he was next invited to assist in the revision of the "Early Days of Berwick" 3rd Edition which was completed in 1979. He then accepted the big task of sifting and assembling information needed for "In the Wake of the Pack Tracks", which was published in 1982.

The Centenary of both the Hall and the Primary School occurred in 1984. The Centenary Committee invited John to compile a history of both. This he did, with help from Terry and Nancy Boura.

In 1992 he published "Ash Wednesday in Upper Beaconsfield", dedicated to Terry who died earlier that year.

The following year he produced "The History of St. John's Anglican Church Upper Beaconsfield" an elegant volume, and then generously donated all copies free of charge to the Church.

Terry, who died on 14th March 1992, was as able and probably even more energetic than John. Whatever she did was well done. We especially remember her for her work as Treasurer of the Fire Brigade and also the Fire Brigade Auxiliary from the time of her arrival in Upper Beaconsfield until her death, and also for her involvement with Red Cross. She was a great contributor, a strong happy

and cheerful lady, who thought and spoke with great clarity.

John and Terry were joint Citizens of the Year in 1980.

John is still helping us. He is responsible for mailing copies of The Village Bell to "expatriates" who wish to receive it, and as a "Citizen" helps to care for the Memorial Gardens. Although he is physically limited - he still wields a "wicked rake" and cares for the occasional bonfire.

### **WHO WAS LENNE?**

Hubert Lenne after whom Lenne Road was named, was born in Cologne, Germany. Migrating to Australia, he selected 75 acres of land at Benalla in 1868, but soon forfeited this selection. The following year he married Charlotte Downing and became a licensed victualler at 181 Clarendon Street Emerald Hill (South Melbourne). Whilst living there they had two children both boys.

On 7th February 1876, Lenne applied for a license to occupy 20 acres of land he had selected in Upper Beaconsfield. Lenne listed his occupation as licensed victualler of Emerald Hill. His request was granted.

The 20 acres he selected was bounded to the south by what was to become Lenne Road. Emerald Road (then called the Main Gembrook Road) was the eastern boundary, and Albers Road defined the northern side, an excellent choice for a hotel.

On 26th July 1881, Lenne applied to purchase the land, which had been surveyed and shown to be 19 acres 3 roods 39 perches. He stated in this application that he had commenced residing on the land on the 1st October 1878, and had built a four roomed weatherboard house.

He had also planted an orchard of three and a half acres, and three acres of crops, obviously a very energetic man. He was given a Grant and purchased his selection.

Lenne must also have planted a grove of pine trees, as The Vagabond (John James), a journalist writing in "The Argus" of 26/11/1885, describes "the pleasant Pinegrove Hotel, (sic) a great stopping place kept by a worthy German settler", and tells of visitors imbibing colonial beer. It was apparently as popular then as it is now.

The Vagabond was staying at Beaconsfield House later called the Beaconsfield Hotel in Salisbury Road, and he states that he could not find a bar there. Although not certain, it would appear that the Pine Grove was our first hotel and Lenne the first hotel keeper. Mrs Somner did later obtain a license for Beaconsfield House and changed the name.
