Joanne Bradshaw Silver medallist in the Para Olympics

After Joanne Bradshaw of Albers Road suffered a disabling stroke five years ago, she decided to channel her competitive energies into the sports of discus, shot put and javelin.

Joanne, who had played State netball at both a junior and senior level, found she was able to demonstrate her prowess equally well in these new fields. She was selected to represent Australia in the Para Olympic World Championship held recently in Birmingham, U.K. in all three sports. The intensive training between February when Joanne found out she was selected and August paid off when she won her class and a silver medal in the discus, came second in the shotput and third in the javelin. To add to her personal triumph Joanne also had the satisfaction of being

part of a great Australian team which was the overall winner of the competition for the first time. Joanne believes that Australia's acknowledged strength in Para Olympics, despite the relatively small numbers of competitors, is due to the encouragement given to athletes with a disability to participate in sport. Until now however Australian teams have only managed to finish second or third.

While the Sydney 2000 games are a consideration, Joanne is undecided whether she wants to make the huge commitment needed to participate. Participation in her first international competition enabled her to prove to herself she could succeed and at this stage she is unwilling to let her sport impact too significantly on her family and other interests.

In the meantime Joanne will continue participating as an able bodied member of the Knox Athletics Club where she is more than able to throw over the qualifying distance in each sport and earn points for her club.



Partners in education

Upper Beac. Primary School was last year fortunate to receive a maintenance grant which allowed the relocation and enclosure of three double portables. This has resulted in the fantastic new Junior Learning Centre, a wonderful asset that the school can enjoy for many years to come.

Changing the buildings also resulted in the need to change the surrounding landscaping. The school's environment committee, consisting of parents Glenn Burridge, Kerryn Hart, Sally Budge and convenor Kevin Cameron, have contributed many hours in order to improve the grounds at Upper Beaconsfield Primary. The main focus this year was to redesign and construct a new paved amphitheatre and seating adjacent to the Junior Learning Centre.

A number of special working bees which commenced in March this year have been attended by a dedicated crew of hardworking parents and teachers.

After the initial excavation by Dale Allen and his bobcat, the team has successfully laid over 300 square meters of paving, erected substantial sleeper garden retaining walls, created excellent seating areas and concreted new paths and access ramps (thanks to local concreters Karl Meyer, Stefan Damiani and Piet Van Dyk).

The huge project culminated on August 2 with a great family garden planting day, under the guidance of Kerryn Hart and Sally Budge, followed by a very well attended sausage sizzle organised by chefs June Gillespie and Roger Gordon.

This development project completes the provision of an aesthetic backdrop to the building and is sure to encourage student use of this important passive area.

Key principles of the Strategy Plan

Following exhibition of the draft Strategy earlier this year the Consultants, Gutteridge Haskins & Davey, have now prepared a final document which has been reviewed by the Steering Committee and will now go to Council for final ratification.

The Strategy Plan has been structured around 8 key principles from which specific actions are identified. These principles are:

Social and Community Issues. To promote and support the retention of key existing community and social services as a matter of priority, and to recognise the importance of these facilities for the long term community viability of Upper Beaconsfield.

Natural systems and Ecology. To ensure that all land management, use and development of land results in a net environmental improvement for the immediate area and wider catchment.

Transport and Movement. To maximise the utilisation and upgrade of the existing road network and any potential upgrade works to promote an efficient and interconnected road system, as well as improved pedestrian and equestrian networks and improved safety for all users.

Residential Development. To provide for limited use and development of land for residential purposes which is undertaken in a manner that reflects and promotes the unique rural landscape of Upper Beaconsfield, be of the highest quality of design and environmental management and result in a wide range of living opportunities for a variety of household types.

Retail, Economy and Commercial. To support existing retail and commercial services within the study area that provide a neighbourhood function, and provide opportunities to maximise the potential for alternative economic activities and local jobs.

Open Space and Recreation. To promote the protection and creation of open space and recreational facilities and public reserves in order to integrate existing native habitat, linear reserves, popular pedestrian, recreational and commercial nodes.

Physical Infrastructure. To recognise the existing infrastructure capacity needs and limitations within the study area,, but also provide opportunities for maximising cost effective servicing for all use and development that is designed to result in minimal environmental and on-site impacts.

Fire Management. To recognise the high fire hazard that exists within the study area and maximise awareness for the need to integrate fire hazard minimisation, habitat management and landscape protection through all use and development of land.

Issues in the news

Upper Beaconsfield Association: Report of August meeting

At the meeting in August we heard of the intrinsic details of the running of the Pre-School Centres and also the need for forward planning of the Recreation Ground.

On the proposed sale of the Civic Offices, Duncan Drive, the UBA subcommittee had previously advised all councillors they did not favour the action. The Mayor at the meeting advised that the Shire was waiting for a valuation of the site. It was resolved to continue to monitor the situation as an Association.

Problems associated with the production of the Bell were highlighted.

Concerns about lack of successful Community Grants were expressed, and safety factors of Charing Cross were discussed. Immediate communication with the Shire was implemented.

On the subject of Township Committees the UBA passed the following motion "This group is to retain its identity as the UBA, with its objectives to be more proactive within the wider community representation".

The meeting adjourned for tea and coffee at 10.25pm.

Township Committee vote

Meeting number Four on Forming a Township Committee was held in the Community Centre on the 16th September 8.00pm. With the Mayor in the Chair and twenty two people present it was resolved -

"That this meeting asks Cardinia Shire Council to invite the UBA to continue to formally act as the voice of the Upper Beaconsfield Community"

Having resolved the purpose of the agenda the meeting closed at 9.10pm.

Notes From Council

Council Meeting.

The Council Meeting on 17th August was held at Upper Beaconsfield in the Primary School Multipurpose Room as part of the ongoing programme of holding meetings at various venues around the Shire. Council sees these meetings away from the Shire Offices as an opportunity for communities to see at first hand, and to participate in, the process of local government.

Amendment L.134.

The UB Strategy Plan which has now been completed will be put to Council within the next month for adoption. The Plan has identified the area at the end of Paul Grove covered by Amendment L.134, among others, as suitable for "in-fill" development.

It is expected therefore that this application for rezoning which was deferred pending the completion of the Strategy Plan will be re-submitted for consideration in the near future.

Note that at this stage only the zoning is at issue. The nature of any subsequent subdivision will need to assessed against the objectives of the Strategy Plan and would be the subject of a further application to Council.

Mobile Library.

Casey-Cardinia Library Corporation has been successful in obtaining funding for a new Mobile Library trailer valued at approximately \$150,000. The new trailer will incorporate significant enhancements including access for the disabled, a larger capsule and the potential to carry additional stock and computers. It is expected to be operational in the new year.

Budget.

The 1998/99 budget outlines expenditure of \$25.387m with a rate contribution of \$10.139m.

Rates.

The General Rate has been struck at 0.004145 based on Capital Improved Value (CIV) which is an increase of 7.35% on last year's rate. The additional income has been earmarked for capital works, primarily increased road projects. The Garbage Rate has been increased 6.9% to \$98, which will cover hard rubbish and green waste collections.

Smoke alarms - a valuable investment

Domestic smoke alarms are readily available, easily installed and easily maintained. There are numerous examples of smoke alarms alerting owners, neighbours, or even passers by, of the presence of fire.

As well as allowing residents to safely evacuate the building, early detection helps keep damage to a minimum allowing salvage of treasured possessions. Smoke alarms are available from hardware stores or supermarkets, and priced as low as \$5. They should be in your house by now!

The smoke alarm will come with an instruction sheet which will provide advice on suitable locations to install the alarms through your house. However, to avoid unnecessary hassle don't install it over the stove top, toaster, or open fireplace!

Smoke alarms should not be painted as this can reduce their ability to detect smoke. Being statically mounted they attract dust which can also compromise their performance, so when vacuuming do the smoke alarm also. Most smoke alarms have a test button which should be checked each month.

Whilst most smoke alarms have a low battery alert, many people fail to notice the cricket-

like chirp. So, to be safe, change your smoke alarm batteries every 12 months. The night the clocks change back from daylight savings is an excellent choice, other people choose Good Friday. Either way, choose a day and change the batteries every year!

Remember these are one of the cheapest but most valuable investments you can make -and all new buildings are required to be equipped with smoke alarms.

Beware -"Aggies" spread rapidly!

Agapanthus is a declared environmental weed on Mornington Peninsula, and could easily become one in Upper Beaconsfield in the future. The flowers are very attractive and many use it to line a pathway, or on the nature strip, where if controlled, it need not be a nuisance.


Unfortunately it is already in many bushland areas, and once established tends to form large clumps, which are not easily removed. A broad sweep with a mattock will usually remove the plant and most of its roots. Let this vegetation dry for a few weeks and then it will burn in a hot fire.

If you do not wish to remove the plant, or are physically unable to do so, at least remove the dying flower heads before they can develop and drop seeds which will germinate and cause you problems in the future.

Improving traffic flow in **Upper Beaconsfield**

Over the years there have been various ideas to improve the traffic flow at the centre of Upper Beaconsfield. The most recent was the roundabout at the Salisbury Road-St. Georges Road-Beaconsfield-Emerald Road intersection. Land was sought but the project appears to have been shelved.

At the last meeting of our Upper Beaconsfield Association it was decided to renew pressure on the Shire of Cardinia for them to improve our traffic flow and traffic safety by action instead of word.

To start our campaign a plan of a suggested solution prepared by one of our residents is shown to start your creative thinking processes working. It is our intention to give the Shire a range of concepts or plans to solve the traffic flow so that they can start the process of achieving a workable solution that can be implemented. We do not want to go into detailed planning because we regard this as the Shire and Vic Roads forte.

Return to Largowan

In 1901 a house known as "Largowan" was owned by Mrs Rushall. Her son Captain Rushall inherited the property and used it as a training ground for an Australian Light Horse unit during World War 1. He continued to live in the house until it was destroyed by fire in 1923.

The following year Rushall built a new home in brick. To reduce the fire danger he had a path built around the house which was asphalted, and had a fire watch seat built in a windmill tower.

When Rushall died in 1926, the house was bought by Charles Martel a French woolbuyer, an elegant and able young man, who called it "Mon Desir". He was very proud of the house which he redecorated and enlarged considerably. He bred pigeons for the table and kept peacocks in an immaculately kept garden. His only son, Maurice joined the RAAF in 1940 and was killed when shot down over Europe. His name is on the War Memorial.

The next owner was Norman Steele, of the prosperous warehousing family, then followed by Gladys Irene Zuyderhout, wife of a retired Dutch sea captain. On 4/11/63 "Mon Desir" was purchased by Baroona Pty. Ltd. the family company of Bess and Keith Ballantyne, who renamed the house "Baroona". In December 1968 they sold to Henry Hugh Strain and Ethel Wynne Strain, who named the house "Highland Park" and converted it to a nursing home.

In November 1992 it was bought by the Harrison family who obtained a Council permit for a restaurant and reception rooms.

The house has now been purchased by Peter Hutton and Ulli Reichardt who have reverted to the old name "Largowan". They will use the house for a restaurant, and say that work on the project will commence in November.

"Fire Safety in the House"

Since 1983 residents of Upper Beaconsfield and surrounding areas have become aware of the dangers in summer resulting from the hot dry conditions and many take precautions to meet the threat of fire.

Recently during a period when I was conducting research to help with a project I was working on as a committee member with Standards Australia, I became aware of a booklet put out by them pertaining to fire safety in the home. This booklet, "Fire Safety in The Home, a guide to residential fire safety", is not a standard as such but is designed to advise the householder on matters concerning fire safety. It is easy to understand and has many suggestions on how to make your home and family as safe as possible in the event of a fire.

Prepared with the assistance of such bodies as National Fire Protection Association, N.S.W. Fire Brigades, C.F.A., Australian Assembly of Fire Authorities, C.S.I.R.O and others it is in my opinion a must for our area and should be in every household.

The cost of the booklet is \$14.50 rrp but if enough people are interested I should be able to order in bulk and pass on any saving. History snippets from St John's

When I last wrote for the Village Bell I mentioned the new Hall and car park project that is progressing gradually at St. John's.

Since then I've been reading some of the original Vestry minutes of the parish - here is an excerpt from the meeting held in the assembly hall on Tuesday afternoon, 2nd of May 1921; the Rev. A Cole presiding as chairman: "That in the opinion of this meeting of members of the Church of England it is desirable that a Church at Upper Beaconsfield be erected in accordance with the Acts of Synod." The motion was carried unanimously by the 19 members present and the meeting went on to appoint a building committee and plan a series of working bees to prepare the block of land.

I first read this while St. John's was in the middle of a series of working bees to prepare the land and our current building committee was debating plans for the Hall. Some things are constants after all!

Baptisms and Weddings

In my first twelve months at St. John's I've heard various concerns expressed by residents of Upper Beaconsfield about the Baptism of Children and Weddings in the church. One minor issue has been the availability of car parking which will be resolved once our new car park is available for use, the other issues, however, are more serious.

Regarding Baptism some have felt that St. John's in the past was too exclusive in its policy so, by way of clarification, I will briefly outline what Baptism means in any Christian Church. Christian Baptism stems from Jesus' command to Baptise those who trust in Him as the Son of God, that is, God Himself in human form, and it represents three things: 1. That we die to ourselves, that is, that we give up on trying to justify ourselves before God. 2. That we begin to live for God, that is, to learn to please Him and not merely ourselves. 3. That we join God's people, that is, the Church. These things are then confirmed by public oaths and statements of faith during the Baptismal service; as you can see, Baptism is very demanding but it always has been because it is a sign of someone beginning to follow Jesus.

Regarding Weddings, the Commonwealth government has a much tighter policy that the Church! We do not require people to either be members of St. John's or even committed Christians for their Wedding to take place at St. John's. We have a policy that outlines the government and church requirements so please feel free to give me a call if you wish to have a copy.

On Sunday the 22nd of November we will stop the current 9.30am Sunday service and replace it with a weekly 8.30am Traditional Anglican service and a 10.00am Family service (in a contemporary style).

Next term our 'First Things' course commences again for people who have questions about the Christian faith - the course runs over six Tuesday evenings from the 13th October and dinner is provided.

The Fourths cut their teeth in 'F' Grade and got the season off with a flying start. Several players were promoted, a couple became unavailable and there was a resultant mid-season slump. Skipper Adam Konecny regrouped his charges well. They found form again but couldn't quite make up the deficit.

Coached by Richard Edwards and led by Marcus Gehling the Under 16's looked a pretty average side early in the season. As the season progressed a noticeable change came over the players who gained both in confidence and performance, eventually to the stage of forcing their way into the semi-final after a great win in the final round. Though the semi was lost, the season was a most interesting one and everyone's perseverance and ability to improve is to be commended.

In similar vein to the Under 16's, our Under 14 team with Rob Hansen as coach and carnival batsman Brendan Webb skippering, the team also started like novices. They were often short on both

confidence and numbers. A few Under 12's started to help out and with a full complement things turned around dramatically. The side pushed up the ladder and ultimately into a semi-final which was also lost by only a wicket. A gutsy season's performance by a relatively inexperienced team.

Our Under 12's, who don't play for points, had a big season winning fourteen out of fifteen games including the Annual Challenge against Flinders. Coached by Roland Betheras and well led by James Haupt they won all of the nine fixtured games, breezed through the qualifying rounds of the knockout competition, but lost the final to Nar Nar Goon in an exciting match. It was yet another one wicket defeat in a final for the club.

Ex 1996-97 player John Stinear was voted club champion after working his way up through the ranks to 'A' Grade where he played a significant role in helping the team avoid relegation. Life memberships were bestowed upon Richard Edwards and Rob Hansen.

The Club committee acknowledges the input from sponsors, the local community, players and supporters throughout the season as well as its responsibilities in running one of the township's major sporting and social facilities.

Golfing now on the net

Beaconhills has launched itself into cyberspace with the development of an Internet site which can be accessed on www.netspace.net.au/~bhillsgc providing up-to-date information for members (including weekly competition results) and the opportunity to market our 36 hole golfing facility at Upper Beaconsfield. Wildlife watch

September 1998

Did you know that there are about 2000 species of native bees in Australia, most no larger than a mosquito?

Did you know that the local golden moth orchid (Diuris pendunculata) is pollinated by only one species of native bee? Therefore no bee no orchid though the bee has been recorded on 29 different plant families!

Australia's native bee population is acknowledged as the most remarkable in the world due to the fact that two predominant families are considered to be primitive because of their short tongues particularly suited to the shallow cup flowers of eucalypts, tea-tree, melaleuca, paper barks, burgan and bottlebrush which grow in such profusion in the Australian bush. One family of solitary bees has short blunt tongues and a semi-social family of bees has short pointed tongues.

Bee shapes vary from tiny and slender to plump and round. Some are bare like wasps and others have thick furry coats. Colours range from black through the complete brilliant palette.

Nests can be constructed in the soil, in excavated pithy stems, in abandoned beetle burrows or in mortar between bricks. A similar hierarchy to the honey bee is present in the social species. In other families the females might live in the same nest but there is no queen and each female manages her own unique cells.

Another snippet of information culled from the from Land for Wildlife News, as were the bee notes, is a useful telephone number for advice about injured native animals. WILD-LINE is available 24 hours a day on 0500 540 000.

Stop Press! I showed a photograph of a spider orchid to a recognised orchid expert at a seminar recently. He immediately identified it as Caladenia lindleyana, the wine-lip orchid. The photograph was taken in my patch of bush in 1983, which means that all this time that the rare species for which I have been hoping has been almost under my feet!!

At this same seminar we were taken on a field trip to see another rare spider orchid which is a

beautiful, unusual shade of smokey pink. Caladenia hastata is pollenised by the male of a native bee which lands on the labellum, regains his balance, steps backward, deliberately rubs his head against a sticky place on the column, deliberately steps backward again, raises his head and positively thumps it several times into the pollen source. Two things result from this. First he has harvested a beautiful cap of pollen and secondly a female bee flies in, quickly mates, removes the cap from the male, rolls it into a ball, flies off into her nest hole where she pulls the door closed and lays one egg. The pollen and nectar collected by all female bees provides sufficient food for the pupae until it is ready to emerge from the nest.

The only action not deliberate in the whole episode was that the owner of the site was in the right place at the right time to witness the pollination and to capture the slow-flying male bee for identification.
