

## Computer lab opens at the Centre

Not long ago, Cardinia Shire Council advised the Upper Beaconsfield Community Centre that funding was still available from the Government of Victoria to set up computers available for community use.

A \$20,000 grant was available on the proviso that the Community Centre provide time for free community access to the computers and the World Wide Web.

The problem was that the Community Centre had

to find a suitable space and have the computers up and running by July, presumably when the funding ran out.

The members of the Community Centre are a very determined lot. They could see that a computer lab would be a great asset for the Community


## Autumn and Winter rainfall

Below average rainfall continued to the end of autumn and into the first half of winter.

Total autumn rainfall was 166.4mm compared to a 34-year average of 239mm. The progressive rainfall to the end of June was 372.8mm compared to an average of 441.1mm, which was a deficit of 68.3mm.

Spring rainfall will now determine the state of our water supply over summer.

## Celebrate the colours of Spring

The Australian Plants Society, Wilson Botanic Park Group Inc, will host a Wattle

Day Celebration and Spring Plant Sale on Saturday, 31st August and Sunday, 1st September 2002 from 10am to 5pm at the Wilson Botanic Park, Princes Highway, Berwick (Mel Ref 111 A 7).

Do you recognise wattles indigenous to the Upper Beaconsfield area? There will be a display of wattles in bloom, both indigenous and also varieties from other States of Australia. As well, there will be a wattle plant give-away for each family, with an emphasis on smaller showy shrubs that are easy to grow. At the same event last year, visitors were able to see advanced pots of Victoria's Centenary of Federation floral emblem, acacia leprosa "Scarlet Blaze". One of these plants was planted in Wilson Botanic gardens at that time.

The golden wattle, acacia pycnantha, was proclaimed the National Floral Emblem of Australia in 1988. In 1992, the first day of Spring, 1st September, was proclaimed as National Wattle Day in all States and Territories. The wattle is considered to be of national significance, historically, symbolically and as a form of our own unique identity as Australians. A number of handouts will be available over the weekend, describing botanical information, the traditional uses for wattles, and providing specific details about the local indigenous wattles. Books on wattles will also be available for purchase.

Not all wattles are desirable, and some wattles that have been introduced from other parts of Australia have in fact become environmental weeds in the Upper Beaconsfield area. These include the Cootamundra Wattle and the Cape Wattle. These species have adapted very well to local conditions, so that they out-compete local plants, spreading quickly and replacing many of the other beautiful native plants indigenous to our local bushland, also impacting on native fauna.

Why not consider combining Father's Day with a picnic at Wilson Botanic Park on Wattle Day, Sunday 1st September, and let the whole family celebrate the colours of spring. More details can be obtained from the event organiser, Charles Hrubos, on 5944 4221.

## Quarry fight enters final phase

Following a great deal of effort, Save the Valley has been successful in our push for CSR to conduct a full Environmental Effects Study (E.E.S.). Our lobbying of the necessary bureaucrats, local government and political representatives has resulted in CSR having to undertake an E.E.S. as part of their application.

Save the Valley Chairman Neville Bassett and committee member Don Petty have been chosen to represent the community and neighbouring property owners on the E.E.S. scoping committee. Whilst the E.E.S. does not provide any guarantees, it at least forces some level of process, and provides an opportunity for the community to formally comment.

Our thanks go to the many community groups and clubs who assisted us in this effort. We also especially thank the U.B.A., Rob MacLellan MLA, Cr. Keith Ewenson, Pakenham Pony Club, Tom-muc Valley Landcare, UB Riding Club, Paradise Action Group and Toomuc Valley Business Group for their active assistance.

While CSR has not been clear on the timing of the E.E.S., the final version may be on public display as early as August-September this year. Depending on the level of public interest shown, this may then be referred on to a Panel Hearing for a recommendation.

The final decision will be made by the Planning Minister after reviewing the Panel recommendation. This will be your opportunity to voice your opinion; even a one page handwritten submission will carry weight!

Our fundraising dinner at Melaleuca Lodge on June 21st was an outstanding success due the efforts of our organizing committee. Thanks once again to all the generous prize donors and sponsors who came forward, and the people who attended.

A good time was enjoyed by all, and we managed to raised some well-needed cash. Your generosity is greatly appreciated and gives us the heart to continue this fight.

# William Alexander White

28th April 1912 - 12th July 2002

"Bill" was born in East Malvern the only boy in a family of five girls, another girl Jean, was born later, and has survived Bill. He attended various primary schools in East Malvern and was then a pupil at Scotch College from 1924 until 1928.

The following year he commenced work at the Collins Street branch of the Commercial Bank of Australasia, continuing there until he joined the A.I.F in June 1940. His unit was the 2nd 1st Ordinance Field Park, 6th Division, which after preliminary training at Williamstown was sent to Sydney. Boarding the Queen Mary on Christmas Day 1940, their destination was Ceylon, on the way to the Middle East. They were then transferred to a troopship, as the Queen Mary was too large for the Suez Canal. The unit arrived in Palestine for final training, and then on to Syria, where he served for two years, Bill was now a corporal, soon after becoming a sergeant.

In 1942 the unit was destined for Singapore, but when Singapore fell they returned to Australia, via Perth and Adelaide.

Now back in Australia Bill was sent to an Officers Training Course, becoming a lieutenant and at this time he met Dorothy. He was promoted to captain in 1943.

In 1945, he was a member of the British Commonwealth Occupation Forces in Japan, where he spent an interesting two years. Returning to Australia, he was discharged in 1947. He rejoined the Collins Street branch of the bank for twelve months, and was then sent to Western Australia.

In 1951 he married Dorothy and they moved to Perth, where Bill worked for a while. He was then made Manager of the Manjimup Branch and whilst there Dianne their daughter was born in 1957. Bill was President of the local golf club for two years, and managed to get his handicap down significantly. The family thoroughly enjoyed Manjimup. The next move was to Pingelly where they spent four happy years.

In 1966 returning to Victoria, Bill became manager of the Pakenham branch of the bank. In 1969 they bought a house at Upper Beaconsfield, and joined the golf club. For some time the Bank insisted that Bill sleep on the bank premises, but eventually they moved to the Upper Beaconsfield house where they lived happily until the fires of Ash Wednesday destroyed it. They rebuilt on the site, moving back in December of 1983.

Bill was a Life Member of Upper Beaconsfield R.S.L. and has been a very good Legatee. He was a member of Pakenham Rotary and later given Honorary Membership of the Upper Beaconsfield Club.

He spent many hours delivering "Meals on Wheels" until forced into retirement at the age of 75 years. His contribution was recognised by the Shire.

Bill was known for his happy and very friendly disposition and great sense of humour. He was noted for taking an opposing position in any debate - a great attribute in a committee member, but sometimes frustrating for the onlookers.

Bill and Dorothy celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary with their family, grandchildren, and friends last year, a few months before Bill's ninetieth birthday. Farewell Bill.

# Local native plants benefit our environment

The plants grown in the Upper Beaconsfield Indigenous Nursery are from local seed and cuttings and are therefore not just native, but indigenous. They grow well in this area with little watering needed and minimum maintenance. They also provide habitat for local birds and wildlife.

The nursery has expanded considerably in the last 12 months to meet the requirements of Land-care groups; Melbourne Water for its Stream Management Program; plantings into Beaconsfield Flora and Fauna Reserve, and wetland plantings along Cardinia Creek at Hillcrest Christian College, amongst others.

With a lot of hard work we managed to grow 15,000 plants for autumn. With some extra help I am now getting plants ready for spring, hopefully we will be able to meet the demand. With the continuing pressure of subdivision on our remaining bush-land I urge you to consider planting indigenous plants for the sake of our wildlife as well as for your enjoyment.

Indigenous plants grow quickly and will reward

you with butterflies, birds and other native animals. I am now growing grasses, as well as sedges and juncus spp. for planting into wet areas.

There are two schemes you might be interested in using, but be unaware of. One is offered by Cardinia Shire Council which encourages landowners to plant indigenous plants into roadside verges. The other is the Stream Management Program offered by Melbourne Water for those with waterways on their property. Funding is available. If you would like brochures relating to either, call at the nursery or contact the relevant authorities.

The nursery is open to anyone wanting plants on Fridays from 12 midday-5pm, or by arrangement. Ring Margaret Cromb on 9707 2415. If you haven't been lately, come and see what is available.

## *Landcare now active in the local area*

Late last year a new Landcare group was formed to service anyone owning land in the Cardinia Creek catchment. Obviously this includes Upper Beaconsfield.

The group is associated with the Cardinia Environment Coalition, an umbrella body covering Friends groups and 8 other successful Landcare groups in the Cardinia Shire.

Our group is at the extreme west of the shire and also covers the eastern end of the City of Casey. We have a committee of 12 and an extended group of 35 and if you would be interested in joining you would be most welcome.

We meet bi-monthly at Hillcrest Christian College, Soldiers Rd., Clyde and meetings are open to anyone interested.

Like all Landcare Groups we are concerned to help landowners protect and enhance the remnant vegetation on their properties as well as restoring waterways and wetlands. Advice and financial assistance is available together with manual assistance with planting.

So far we have assisted a landowner in Foot Rd with the removal of large numbers of pittosperum and will help with the planting of indigenous plants on this property at an

appropriate time. We are to work with Melbourne Water on 2 large properties abutting Cardinia Creek in the Clyde area. This is an area totally denuded of native vegetation so it will be exciting to watch it being transformed.

Because we are in an area on the urban fringe we are ready to be involved on small blocks as requested and would welcome any enquiries.

## Wildlife Watch

This is getting monotonous. Another low rainfall period! I notice that the wildflowers are being affected I this season. And not only them but also the fungi that \ usually brighten winter have been sparse. Nevertheless I found one, which I have not seen before, that was the same shape as a field mushroom ! but of a colour hard to define. An artist friend helped decide it was close to burnt sienna. Stems of young specimens were a bright yellow that gradually changed to paler shadings of the cap colour. One, collected when mature and wet by rain, had an almost putrid smell.

From my bedroom window I noticed a swamp wallaby nibbling grass near the mint bush. When she stood to watch my movement I saw a small face peering over the edge of her pouch. Earlier in the month I was weeding under a long-leafed box when a flock of gang-gangs arrived to feed on seedpods. In the process they showered me with twigs, leaves and bitten gum nuts. The smell of eucalyptus was almost overpowering.

We should be in for a deal of pleasure if we can rely on a wet February boding well for a prolific spring orchid display. Nodding and tall greenhoods began to flower during the first week of July just as the gnat orchids were finishing. Leaves of many others are already up. Correas and cat's claw grevillea have been attracting bright and busy honeyeaters all winter and | soon appleberry creeper and honey-pots will add to the smorgasbord. Other flowers to watch for include white early nancys, gold and red pultenea and dillwynia shrubs, and most of the wattles around here that flower during the next two months.

Even with all that strong wind which has been beleaguering the bush this season not one of our living trees has fallen though a couple of green branches have crashed. I had to wend my way around many dead trees: post-fire wattles come to the end of their life span, large eucalypts which died during the 1983 fires and some recently drought-killed, which clutter my track down the hill, contemplating a future fuel reduction burn as I went. Fresh twigs littering the ground yielded gumnuts for seeds.

## *Birds of Cardinia - A Field Guide*

This excellent compact volume produced by Cardinia Environment Coalition Inc. priced at \$6.60, is wonderful value. It contains colour photographs of 67 species; most of them may readily be seen in the district. In general, the photographs are very good, all are of sufficient quality to allow the positive identification of a bird in the field. Several illustrations show both male and female of the species.

The introduction contains advice on attracting birds to your property, and helping to ensure the future of our native birds. A bonus is an account of the bird, its habitat, nest, food, and the size of each bird illustrated. Laura Levens wrote this valuable text.

The layout is excellent, the content extensive. All the birds illustrated are indigenous, and with a few exceptions were photographed in a bushland setting. The photography by Simon Dustan reflects credit on his ability and application. A great effort.

The booklet is a welcome and valuable addition to local environmental information.

## Watch out for wombats!



## Australian Red Cross

The annual general meeting of the Berwick/Upper Beaconsfield Red Cross Unit was held on Friday 12 July at the RSL Hall, Langmore Lane, Berwick.

Guest speaker was Mrs Lois Williams who gave a very amusing talk on "Remembering the good old days". The reminiscences delighted members and guests, but at the same time highlighted the fact that Red Cross units, along with many other voluntary organizations have difficulty in attracting new members to continue the valuable service given by members in some instances for 40, 50 or even occasionally 60 years.

During the past year Jennie Coventry has had the combined role of Chairman/Secretary and will continue for a second year, with the assistance of Helen Fyfe and Marion Limpus.

Gyneth Troy has held the role of Treasurer, but with health problems she is unable to continue the excellent work she has done for many years without assistance. Gyneth has been responsible for the co-ordination of the March Red Cross Calling in the Berwick area and it will be a major priority to find a replacement to take over this task.

Red Cross Calling relies heavily on "friends of Red Cross" and the co-ordinator does not necessarily need to be a member of a Unit. The position would ideally suit a retired businessman with a good knowledge of the Berwick area, with time and contacts to help recruit the many voluntary callers necessary to cover the rapidly growing new estates.

The Unit welcomes two new members Betty Brown and June Naylor who joined at the AGM. The unit meets on the second Friday of each month at 10am in the RSL Hall Berwick and would appreciate enquiries from anyone who feel they can contribute to the work of Red Cross. The Berwick/Upper Beaconsfield Red Cross Unit has a history of more than 80 years and it would be a pity if through lack of more active members, it was unable to carry on.





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
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
