

School upgrade finally going ahead

The primary school recently received the exciting news that the school upgrade will start soon.

Originally announced several years ago, the upgrade had been on the regional priority list for a number of years. As the school is 120 years old and in fact has only one permanent classroom, the upgrade is long overdue. The project had been kept on hold for various reasons, including school fires in other areas. Upper Beaconsfield finally got the go ahead in the state government budget announced early May.

Stage I of the project will cost \$1.5 million. The works will be tendered in the next few months with construction hopefully commencing before the end of the year and taking 12 months to complete.

There will be four new classrooms, new staff and administration facilities, the refurbishment of the current art room into two new classrooms and the refurbishment of the current staff room into a new visual arts centre. A new septic system will also be installed. The portable classrooms will have to stay until the new classrooms are completed. Stage I will be built in the area adjacent to the staff car park. Everyone will have the chance to see

the master plan on display soon in the foyer outside the general office.

The school administration, led by Principal Gordon Atkin and school council lobbied long and hard, liaising with relevant government authorities and local MP Tammy Lobato to achieve this result. Everyone involved should be congratulated for their hard work and vision. There are also plans underway for Stage 2, yet to be finalised, which will include more classrooms, a music facility and canteen.

Other news

The school, students' family and friends attended Education Week celebrations on Wednesday 26th of May 2004. Beaconsfield Upper Primary School will celebrate its 120-year anniversary on Sunday November 7th, 2004. Look out for more news later.

The fight is still well and truly on

Readers of the Bell who have followed this issue over the past six years may be surprised to learn that the fight is still well and truly on. Unfortunately common sense has NOT prevailed. The new owners of the former CSR Quarry, Readymix (owned by multinational Rinker Holdings from Florida), are continuing their push to expand the Mt. Shamrock quarry into the Toomuc Valley.

We were successful in January 2002 in forcing Readymix to undertake an Environment Effects Statement, which involves a number of "independent" detailed studies to be undertaken so the community can judge the merits of the proposal on an informed basis before it is assessed by an independent panel.

The E.E.S. is fully funded by Readymix and the process is supposed to involve community consultation by way of residents' meetings and a Technical Contact Group (T.C.G.), which represents many community groups including the U.B.A.

We have found the so-called "consultation" to be little more than a sham and extremely frustrating for all the participants. Despite repeated requests for copies of draft reports, Readymix has refused and at one stage a TCG meeting was not held for over 14 months! When the reports finally arrived in March 2004 we were given only a matter of 5 weeks to comment on their scope. This is despite the fact that some reports were completed as early as July 2003! We also believe some reports to be inaccurate, poorly structured and heavily biased towards getting the answer that Readymix wants to hear. The effort and cost in wading through lengthy and complex documents is a serious drain on our very limited resources.

The original estimate by Readymix for a completed E.E.S. by July 2002 has proved to all of us that they are yet again encountering serious problems with this proposal.

Our best estimate now is for the Panel hearing to occur towards the end of this year, although with the standard of reports tabled so far, this may even slip into 2005.

We will be continuing our fundraising efforts, as we need to go the Panel fully armed to match the vast resources that are pitted against us. Your support for our cause to the benefit of the residents of both Upper Beac and the Valley who are affected by this proposal has been, and continues to be, greatly appreciated. As always, we welcome anyone in the community with skills or experience who feels he or she can help us to come forward.



Over 8 months and still no toilet!



The rebuilding of the \$75,000 public toilet in Charing Cross has unfortunately turned into a fiasco. Now the unfinished toilet block is turning into an eyesore, with weeds growing amongst the piles of bricks.

The latest news is that the portable loo will stay until the toilet block is finished. The shire board gives instructions to people to find alternative public toilets at the Recreation Reserve but the map is not very clear for outsiders to follow, see picture. Members of the Upper Beaconsfield Community Complex Buildings and Grounds Committee have had the unpleasant task of cleaning up after people have used Keith Ewenson Park as a toilet. Not happy Jan!

The price of progress

When our family came to live in Upper Beaconsfield 30 years ago the Recreation Reserve precinct was a small country oval with a school nearby. The area was basically park and bushland with wildflower areas.

Then a new kindergarten was built on the reserve when it outgrew the McBride Road site. Later, after Ash Wednesday bushfires, a bigger oval and the Igloo were constructed, and the kinder rebuilt. A BMX track was put in for the kids. Demand for sporting facilities grew as well as the spread in educational facilities. The horse riding groups developed riding areas and clubrooms.

There are more demands being made by the various user groups for improvements. Parking has become an issue. There have been suggestions discussed in recent years for a new stadium and more lighting. There are proposals to use the BMX track area for more parking or for extensions to the kinder for growing enrolments. Some people have suggested asphaltting the car parking area.

My concern is that if we are not careful, the urbanisation of Upper Beaconsfield will turn Upper Beaconsfield Recreation Reserve into an oval surrounded by a large car park and buildings.

The reserve committee has a difficult job balancing all the different user groups' needs. I hope that all improvements are undertaken in keeping with the attractive rural character of the area and to retain as much bushland as possible.

The new Beaconsfield Community Complex in O'Neil road is well underway and looks certain to open in early October. I would like to remind you about the 50 kilometres of road sealing that Council has commenced. Now for the toilet block. Council is currently working to resolve the issues of the public toilet in Upper Beaconsfield. Here are the facts. The builder constructed a slab that was not in accordance with the plans and is not deemed to be acceptable by the building surveyor. The builder was instructed to repair the slab or demolish the building. The builder, building surveyor and construction engineers have had a number of meetings and now agree that the slab cannot be rectified to satisfy permit requirements. The builder has not been paid for any works. Council is considering terminating the contract and received a quote from a competent builder who is prepared to erect the toilet block at no additional cost once the existing structure is removed. I appreciate the local concern in respect to this project, however it is something out of the control of Council. I have been working with the General Manager Assets & Services to resolve this matter and apologise for the inconvenience caused. We now look forward to a quality building being constructed.

Once again thanks for your continued support and I look forward to a great term as Mayor.

Local news

Two important concerns have been agitating the locals during the year. First is the hardy perennial of traffic problems. Tammy Lobato MP, Cr G. Runge and Mr I. Pope representing the UBA, met with VicRoads and Cardinia Shire representatives, which resulted in alleviation of some minor points. VicRoads are still resisting major works because this section of Emerald Road is not on the Black Spot list.

Second is the toilet block - indications are that a replacement contractor should be demolishing and rebuilding the inappropriately constructed existing building before too long. A third contractor has been alerted in case the second contractor is not able to respond without delay. UBA has requested a portable toilet block in the interval. Due to fears of vandalism this has been deemed inappropriate. Currently users are directed to use the Recreation Reserve toilets. Cr Runge has agreed to investigate the possibility that cleaners who were attending to the old block will be directed to perform those duties at the Recreation Reserve. The meeting considered it inappropriate to expect volunteers to take up the slack.

A resident has suggested that the UBA should look for suggestions from the community for using funds in hand. Our Constitution states that surplus funds are to be used for emergency relief or projects that benefit the community as a whole. There are plans afoot for a multi-purpose 'rotunda/stage' for use at the Carols by Candlelight and as a picnic shelter in Keith Ewenson Park, to which the UBA intends to make a donation. This is to replace the ageing truck, generously loaned on many occasions by the Russo Brothers. A preliminary design was exhibited at our April meeting. Ongoing support for Village Bell, as and when needed, requires financial reserves to be held.

Perhaps you noticed SAM (speed advisory monitor) standing in Emerald Road, during the first week in April, chastising speeding drivers and patting others on the back. Cr Runge organised this first outing in Cardinia, since acquisition by Cardinia and Casey councils, in the hope that it will have had an effect on traffic safety through that section of Emerald Road. It was interesting to learn that many of the early birds driving to work were the main speeding culprits.

Platypus return to Cardinia Creek



Star of the show—a healthy young platypus

Three juvenile platypuses (*ornithorhynchus anatinus*) have been released into Cardinia Creek as part of a joint project between the Australian Platypus Conservancy and Melbourne Water.

Platypus once inhabited Cardinia Creek but the local population was destroyed during the 1983 Ash Wednesday bushfires. The river environment has now recovered sufficiently to provide a bountiful supply of yabbies, invertebrates and insects for the new inhabitants.

The platypuses will be monitored closely over the next few months by radio tracking devices and, if they adapt successfully, three more animals will be introduced next year with the ultimate aim of introducing up to 10 platypuses into the creek.

The actual site of the release has been kept secret to protect the animals from disturbance, but the re-introduction was witnessed by Cr. Garry Runge (pictured) and several local residents.

The platypuses (two females, one male) were sourced from the Tarago and Labertouche Rivers, both of which have large platypus populations.

Platypus are active from evening to early morning. They sleep in burrows just above water level, usually with entrances under tree roots. They hibernate between May to September in the southern states. Females commence breeding at two years of age. Food is obtained by sifting the river bed with the bill. It is stored in cheek pouches whilst underwater, then chewed and ground after surfacing.



Check your chimney!

People who leave their fires smoking, especially on cold still nights, should realise that this practice causes a severe reduction in air quality. One night recently, the smell of smoke hung around all night and went right through the house. The culprit chimney was spotted the next morning


a few doors away, a thick plume of smoke pouring out. Because the air was still, the smoke accumulated and lay in a blanket over many homes in the vicinity.



Large amounts of smoke are produced when a new fire is loaded with too much wood too soon. Build the fire up gradually with smaller pieces first and keep the draught open.



Although the wood is now well alight, there is not enough air to produce a clean burn. Open the draught.



Fire is burning well and efficiently. Little or no smoke, with bright coals.

The graphics here were obtained from Wingecarribee Shire Council in the Southern Highlands of NSW.

The environment there is very similar to that of Upper Beaconsfield's rolling hills and valleys with bushland.

The wood smoke problem there has led the council to offer cash incentives to replace old heaters, to send council roaming patrols out in the winter to locate problem heaters (or owners) and a public education program.

Cricket Club news

The Cricket Club finished the season well with A Grade and C Grade having good wins against Catani in the final round. Scott and Steve both played in the West Gippsland Country Week side with Scott taking 6 wickets in one of the games. Paul Matthews also bowled quite well and nearly won the bowling award when he took 6 wickets in the final game. James Haupt had a very good first year in the senior side as our new ball strike bowler and worked up very good pace. James had played junior cricket at the club previously and proved to be a very handy pickup. Unfortunately, he is studying in Ballarat this year but we are hopeful he may want to drive back each weekend to play next season. Steve Carr has indicated he will play on at Upper Beaconsfield next year, so that is great news for the club. However, this could be said about most of the clubs, so the challenge for us is to attract players to the club, especially those who live up here but play for other sides or in other competitions.

C Grade finished the season off well with three wins in a row and also finished 9th.

The top batsman was Chris Reid who was very consistent making 236 runs at 28.3. The bowling trophy was won by Michael Preston with an average of 22.7 and the team champion was Dave Edwards who had his best season at the club making 169 runs and taking 13 wickets.

E Grade was well led by David Green who had to contend with many weeks of having only 7 or 8 players making it almost impossible to play good cricket, but he was certainly the standout player and won the bowling trophy. The evergreen president, Rob Hansen, won the batting trophy because no one could get through his rock solid defence. Speaking of Rob Hansen, the cricket club and the community of Upper Beaconsfield should thank Rob because he was the main force behind the cricket club reforming 20 years ago and now it is up to others in the club and the community to continue supporting this organisation because Rob is stepping down from the club and moving out of the area. So, to Rob, a heartfelt thank-you for all the work done for the cricket club over the last 20 years both within Upper Beaconsfield and through the cricket association.

Another person who has helped a great deal this season once again was Paul Halfpenny in his capacity as coach. Every week he would turn up to coach players and offer support, no matter the number attending training. As the captain of the victorious A Grade in 1993 and one of the league's premier players over a long period of time, Paul has plenty to offer in this capacity.

The Junior teams had a slow start to the season. We fielded U 14 and U 12 teams with Rob Hansen and Greg Eagle in charge of the U 14's. Most of the players came from outside the area and, with a large number going to Haileybury, it made it difficult to field a side every week. However, the main job of a cricket club is to provide a game of cricket for all ages and all levels and at least we did this. A number of the senior players helped out on Saturday when Rob went off to do his local area broadcast on the cricket show and the club would like to thank them for their support.

The U 12s were quite a success story with five players turning out for the first match but by the end of the season 17 players were lining up under the coaching of Grant Andrewartha, culminating in their first win in the last game of the year. I helped with coaching on Thursday nights and what stood out was the huge improvement in the players from the start of the season to the end. I hope all 17 will play again next year in the U 14 and U 12.

A number of the U 12 players will move up to the U 14 next season so we will need more players at both levels. If you would like to play cricket next season but have not had a go before, come along and give it a try. If you live in the area but play elsewhere, how about giving us another try? We intend to be much better organised next year because there is no doubt we were not at the start of last season for the juniors and, consequently, there was not a great deal of interest. However, with the great efforts of the U 12 in recruiting so many players, it gives us hope for next season.

Ideally, we would like to field an U 16 team if there is enough interest, but this is traditionally the hardest level to fill throughout the association.

The U 12 batting award went to Tom Jennings, the bowling award to Sean Smith and Matt Hutson and the coaches' award to Alistair Conn. All the other players received a participation trophy and it seemed the parents had a great time at the Friday night BBQs during the game.

Wildlife Watch

Autumn diary

1/3/2004: Walked down hill, didn't see any thistles or ragwort so maybe dry weather has discouraged those pests. Blue wrens back in sedges near tanks. Heard rufus whistler. Magpies seem to have discontinued breeding after fledging five young.

12/3/2004: Pied currawongs are around again. Kookaburra, magpies and butcherbird are still begging for meat. Black sheoaks male flowers showing, teatree and hop wattle shooting from desiccated, leafless sticks.

19/3/2004: The only indigenous plant in flower is the small dodder laurel, tiny white balls on twining stems among grasses.

28/3/2004: Visitors to the water dish today included superb blue wrens, scarlet robins, white eared honey eaters, grey fantail, red-wattle bird, peewee, magpies, little wattle bird, crimson rosellas, king parrots, kookaburras, grey thrush, striated thornbills and brown headed honey eaters.

9/4/2004: Another walk through my patch of bush yielded one spear thistle and the first greenhood orchid leaves. So far mosquito orchid plants have not shown. My records show that start of their flowering has varied between April 4 and May 15.

11/4/2004: Took a walk in a different area of my patch of bush where several species of orchid usually flower and there I found one solitary mosquito orchid plant. Only 4mm rain so far this month, which is probably affecting the flora and possibly also field mice and antechinus, that are usually causing havoc inside at this time of year, but haven't appeared.

16/4/2004: Another walk among the trees at the bottom of the hill before the rain. Found red-tip greenhood and sharp midge orchid, slender stems holding small green and red flowers above the grass.

20/4/2004: Have read in a Birds Australia article that grey falcons are rarely seen as far south as here. I have seen it twice in several years and heard its call, similar to a small dog yapping in groups of five.
